TRUST DEED

TRUST DEED

May 1985 by Mr. Nissar Ahmed, residing at No. 825, 3rd Cross, Mahalakshmi Layout, Bangalore 560086, hereinafter referred to as 'DONOR', which expression shall mean and include his legal heirs, successors and representative, witnesses as follows:-


whereas the Donor being an educationist is desirous of creating an Educational Trust for the purpose of promoting educational and vocational pursuits through educational institutions meant particularly for the religious and linguistic minorities and is also desirous of constituting a Board of Trustees consisting of the following persons as the Trustees for the present:

- 4. Pr. N.A.(Shi) 590, II Rajaji 1440, 560.0

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AND SHEREAS the Donor having donated a sum of Rs.3.000/- (Rupees Three Thousand) only towards the funds of the Trust, has vested the said funds in the Trustees aforementioned who have consented to be the first Trustee of the Trust under this deed;

AND WHEREAS the said Trustees: have been put in possession of the aforementioned funds of the Trust and as such they own, posses and manage the same and undertake to carry out the purpose of the Trust within the ambit and power of authority vested in them by virtue of these presents.

NOW THIS INDENTURE WITNESSETH THAT in pursuance of the aforesaid decision, conviction and in dedication of the funds hereby transferred in favour of the TRUST in implementation of the scheme arising out of the desire and arbition of the Donor and in acceptance of the same by the TRUSTEES, the Donor hereby declares and constituted the TRUST and hereby declares that the TRUSTES will run and organise the TRUST to achieve the following objects subject to the powers and provisions hereinafter declared and expressed for the purpose of establishing, managing and developing educational institutions mainly for the benefit of and for catering to the educational



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needs of LINQUISTIC AID RELIGIOUS MINORITIES and generally to provide educational opportunities to all classes of students irrespective of caste, religion and creed.


- 1. The name of the TRUST created under this DEED shall be "Abdul Hameed Memorial Educational Trust" also known as "A.H. Memorial Educational Trust".
- 2. The Registered office of the Trust shall locate at No. 696, III Stage, III Block, West of Chord Road.

 Bangalore 560079 which is a rented building and on the date of this deed there is no immovable, properties belonging to the Trust.
 - 3. The objects of the Trust shall be as follows:-
 - (a) To establish educational institutions for providing training in professional, technical, medical and general education from Nursery to Degree classes and also higher education;
 - (b) To establish and manage or to take over and manage one or more educational institutions particularly for the benefit of linguistic and religious minorities and



in general for all classes of students irrespective of casts, religion and creed;


- (a) To establish, manage and develop institutions to promote interests in Arts, Science, Literature and Languages, from Nursery to College levels according to the needs of particularly linguistic and religious minorities and generally of all classes.
- (d) To encourage and propagate adult literacy;
- (e) To acquire properties, movable or immovable, by purchase, gift, donations etc. and to re-sell, lease or otherwise deal with the same in furtherance of the aims of the Trust.
- (f) To collect funds for the proper conduct of the institutions under its management as donations, by way of contributions, aids, membership fees or any other source in any mannaer.
- (g) To organise public opinion in matters of educational importance and to do such other things as are incidental or conducive to the attainment of the objects of the Trust.



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- (h) To edit, print, publish or/and distribute books, magazines, materials and pamphlets relating to educational subjects;
- (i) to institute scholarships and freeships;
- (j) and, generally to do anything incidental or confucive to the above objects or any of them.
- 5. The Trustees shall bind themselves to manage and deal with the educational institutions run by the Trust in such a manner as may be most beneficial to the growth of the institutions and shall do every such thing as may be legally necessary for the maintenance and proper functioning of the said institutions:
- 6. For the purpose of administration of the affairs of the Trust and the institutions under the Trust, the Trustees together shall form themselves into a Board of Trustees.
- 7. Mr. Nissar Ahmed, the DOMOR and AUTHOR of the TRUST herein shall be the life-time FARASING TRUSTEE of the BOARD OF TRUSTEES. He shall guide and supervise the destinies, proceedings and functioning of the TRUST and in the event of any dispute arising in respect of the interpretation






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of the terms in the INUST DEED of the objects of the TRUST, his decision shall be final. He shall also be the Chairman of all the Managing Committees constituted by the Board of Trustees to run and supervise the different activities of the Trust to carry out and implement any of the objects of the Trust.

- 8. When the Donor who shall be the Maraging Trustee of the Trust for life time ceases to be the Managing Trustee by death or otherwise, any person nominated by him during his life time by specific testament, or any of his legal heirs shall become the DONOR TAUSTEE of the Trust.
- 9. The Board of Trustees shall have powers to receive subscriptions, donations, gifts, grants from the Government or public bodies or individuals or organisations and shall have powers to acquire by way of purchase, gifts, grants, demise amalgamation taking over or otherwise, property of every description including movable and immovables for the use and the benefit of the Trust and calculated to promote the aims and objects of the Trust.
- 10. The Managing Trustees shall be empowered to raise loans or advances repayable with on without interest from Banks



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or individuals at the time of need and also to acquire land to construct buildings for the educational institutions of the Trust. The Managing Trustees shall also have the powers to raise funds by organising benefit.

- 11. The Trustees shall dedicate themselves to edvancement of enucation and shall encourage and organise lectures, debates, discussions, symposia, book reviews and allied literary and cultural activities without any profit motive.
- 12. To translate the above objects into action, the Trustees shall endeavour to start new institutions or take over or amalgamete with the Trust other running educational institutions when the need is falt.
- 13. The Board of Trustees are empowered to form Hanaging Countities for the day-do-day administration and working of the educational institutions and the committees so formed shall meet in accordance with the Rules and Regulations laid down for that purpose.
- 14. The Board of Trustees shall have powers to frame Rules for the conduct of business and proceedings connected with the administration of the institutions also lay down

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the Rules and Regulations for conducting the business and proceedings of the Managing Committee formed by them from time to time.


- 15. The Managing Trustee shall have powers whenever he thinks expedient to apply any part of the Trust Funds in acquiring or purchasing or taking on lease or otherwise any land or building for the development of the Trust activities.
- 16. The Board of Trustees may at any time whenever felt expedient apply any part of the funds for the publication of books compatible with the educational aims and curricular as well as the cultural values and importance.
- 17. So far as the investment is concerned, the funds of the Trust shall be invested in accordance with the provisions of Section 13(1)(d) read with Section 13(5) of the Income Tax Act 1961.
- 18. The Board of Trustees shall fixthe remuneration for the Managing Trustees, Secretary and other persons associated with the activities of the Trust from out of the Junda. However, payent of remuneration to them shall be reasonable and commensurate with the actual service rendered by each of them for the benefit of the Trust.



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- 19. The Managing Trustee shall have the powers to sanction all payments of the Trust from out of the funds of the Trust.
- 20. The Board of Trustees shall naintain or cause to be maintained correct accounts of the Income and Expenditure of the Trust.
- 21. The Managing Trustes shall have powers to appoint Clerks, Manager, Teachers and other staff for different repartments of the educational institutions under the Trust and fix their remuneration and frame service rules and further have powers to dispense with the services of any employee's if his/ner services are not desirable or required, with due notice wherever necessary.
 - 22. Notwithstanding anything contained in this Deed the Board of Trustees shall have powers to modify, add, delete, smend any of the clause clauses of the document or incorporate new provisions in this document consistent with the objects and purpose of the Trust provided at least three-fourth of the Trustees agree to the same.
 - 23. Three-fourth of the total number of members shall form the quorum for all purposes including the amendment to this Deed.



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- 24. The Managing Trustee shall have powers to negotiate, conclude and effectuate such agreements with the State and Central Governments or any other local authorities or bodies or Company or Companies or individuals for the purpose of obtaining financial or technical air or any rights, privileges or concessions, if any, in any form as they deem fit on such terms and conditions as may appear fit to them or the furtherance of the objects of the Trust.
- 25. The Board of Trustees and the Trustees individually are to be generally governed by the provisions of the Indian Trust Act.
- 26. The Board of Trustees shall meet at least once in every three months to take stock of the progress actieved and to transact other business pertaining to the activities of the Trust.
- 27. The Board of Trustees shall appoint a Chartered
 Accountant or a Certified Auditor and get the accounts
 addited yearly and appoint an Advocate as and when
 occasion arises and they shall be paid reasonable
 remunerations for their advices.



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- 28. The Managing Trustee shall have the power to remove any of the Trustees if any of the acts of such TRUSTEE/S is detrimental in any manner to the TRUST or to the interest of educational institutions under the TRUST.
- 29. The Managing Trustee shall have the power to nominate any new or additional Trustees on conditions and terms to be indicated by the Managing Trustee himself.
- 30. The Managing Trustee shall open accounts/Account in any Bank/Banks in the name of the Trust or in the names of educational institutions under the Trust and he shall operate the said Account/Accounts himself or he may also authorise any other Trustee in Writing to operate such account/8.
- 31. Upon dissolution or winding up of the Trust, if ther shall remain after the settlement of all its debts and limitities, any property whatsoever, the same shall not be paid to or distributed among the Trustess or any one also but shall be given to some other Trust or Society or Charitable Institution or Association or institutions whose objects are similar to those of this Trust.




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resolved to incorporate and carryout certain amendments in the registered Trust Deed dated 23rd May 1985 :

The following translation of the ಪ್ರೆಸಡೆನ್ನಿ ವಿಶ್ವವಿದ್ಯಾಲಯ ಅಧಿನಿಯಮ, 2013 (2013ರ ಕರ್ನಾಟಕ ಅಧಿನಿಯಮ 天の式 41) in the English language is published in the Official Gazette under the authority of the Governor of Hamataka under clause [3] of Article 348 of the Constitution of India.

EARNATAKA ACT NO. 41 OF 2013

(First Published in the Karnataka Gazette Extra ordinary on the Twenty-fifth day of March, 2013)

PRESIDENCY UNIVERSITY ACT, 2013

(Received the assent of the Governor on the Twenty second day of March, 2013)

An Act to establish and incorporate in the State of Karnataka, a University of unitary nature in the private sector by A. H. Memorial Education Trust, Bangalore, to promote and undertake the advancement of applied University education in Business and Management Studies, Life Sciences, Computer Science & Information Technology and other Technical courses, Medical Sciences and allied sectors and for the matters connected therewith or incidental thereto.

Whereas, it is expedient to establish and incorporate in the State of Karnataka, a University of unitary nature in private sector by the A.H. Memorial Educational Trust, Bangalore, to promote and undertake the advancement of applied University Education in - Business and Management Studies, Life Sciences, Computer Science & Information Technology and other Technical courses, Medical Sciences and allied sectors and for the matters connected therewith or incidental thereto for the purposes hereinafter appearing;

Be it enacted by the Kamataka State Legislature in the sixty fourth year of the Republic of India as follows:-

CHAPTER - I PRELIMINARY

- 1. Short title, extent and commencement. (1) This Act may be called the Presidency University Act. 2013.
 - (2) It extends to the whole of the State of Farmataka.
- (3) It small come into force on such date as the State Government may, by notification, in the official (удеяте, ардиния).
 - 2. DeEnitions. In this Acc unless the context otherwise requires,-

- (b) "Agenda Matters" means all the matters and businesses to be designated in the Statutes each of which can be either included in the Agenda or be taken up for discussion and decision at a meeting of the Board of Covernors or the Board of Management or any Committees, as the case may be, only subject to the prior written approval of the Chancellor, consenting to the passing of such matters and businesses at such a meeting:
 - (c) "Board of Governors" means the Board of Governors of the University as specified in Section 23;
- (d) "Board of Management" means the Board of Management of the University as specified in Section 24;
- (e) "Chancellor", "Vice-Chancellor", "Pro Vice-Chancellor" means respectively the Chancellor, Vice Chancellor and Pro Vice Chancellor of the University;
 - (f) "Campus" means a campus established, maintained by the University wherever situated;
- (g) "Committees" means the committees formed under this Act or by the various functionaries of the University as the case may be and includes the Nomination Committee, the Finance Committee and such other committees:
 - (h) "Constituent College" means a college or institution established and maintained by the University;
 - "Finance Committee" means the Finance Committee of the University as specified in Section 27;
 - (j) "Government" means the Government of Karnataka;
- (k) "National Accreditation bodies" means a body established by the Central Government for laying down norms and conditions for ensuring academic standards of higher education, such as University Grants Commission. All India Council of Technical Education, National Council of Teacher Education, Medical and Dental Councils of India, Pharmaceutical Council of India, National Council of Assessment and Accreditation, Indian Council of Agriculture Research. Council of Scientific and Industrial Research etc. and includes the Government;
 - (I) "Prescribed" means prescribed by rules made by the Government under this Act;
- (m) "Principal in relation to a Constituent College" means the head of the Constituent College and includes, where there is no Principal or in the absence of a Principal appointed, the Vice-Principal or any other person for the time being appointed to act as Principal;
 - (n) "Registrar" means the Registrar of the University:
- (o) "Regional Centre" means a centre established or maintained by the University for the purpose of coordinating and supervising the work of Study Centres in any region and for performing such other functions as may be conferred on such centre by the Board of Management;
 - (p) "Sponsoring Authority" or "Sponsoring Body" in relation to this Act means the Founding Trust;
 - (q) "State" means State of Kamataka;
- (r) "Statutes" and "Regulations" means respectively the Statutes and Regulations of the University made under this Act;
- (s) "Study Centre" means a centre established and maintained by the University for the purpose of advising, counseling or for rendering any other assistance required by the students in the context of the education;
- (i) "Teacher" means and includes a Professor. Associate Professor. Assistant Professor. Reader or Lecturer or such other person as may be appointed for imparting instruction or conducting or to guide research in the University or in a Constituent College and includes the Principal of Constituent College in conformity with the norms prescribed by the University Grants Commission;
 - (a) Trust means the AE Memorial Educational Trust registered under the Trust Act, 1882.
- (v) "University Grants Commission" means the Commission established under section 4 of the University Grants Commission Act, 1956 (Central Act 3 of 1956);
 - (w) "University" means the Presidency University established and in corporated under this Act.
 - (x) "Visitor" means the visitor of the University as specified in section 13.

CHAPTER - II THE UNIVERSITY AND SPONSORING BODY

- Proposal for the establishment of the University. (1) The Trust shall have the right to establish
 the University of unitary nature subject to and in accordance with the provisions of this Act.
 - (2) The proposal to establish a University shall be made to the State Government by the Trust.
 - (3) The proposal shall contain the following particulars, namely:-
 - (i) the objectives of the University along with the details of the Trust;
 - (ii) the extent and status of the University and the availability of land;
- (iii) the nature and type of programmes of study and research to be undertaken by the University during a period of five academic years immediately following the commencement date:
 - (b) the academic resource (faculties), courses of study and research proposed to be started:
 - (v) the campus development such as buildings, equipment and structural amentics;
- (vi) the phased outlays of capital expenditure for a period of five academic years immediately following the commencement date;
- (vii) the item-wise recurring expenditure, sources of finance and estimated expenditure for each student;
- (viii) the scheme for mobilizing resources and the cost of capital thereto and the manner of repayments to each source;
- (ix) the scheme of generation of funds internally through the recovery of ice from students, revenues anticipated from consultancy and other activities relating to the objects of the University and other unitcipated incomes;
- (x) the details of expenditure on unit cost, the extent of concessions or rebates in fee, freeship and scholarship for students belonging to economically weaker sections and the fee structure indicating varying rate of fee, if any, that would be levied on students who are either non resident Indians or persons of Indian origin or sponsored by non resident Indians or persons of Indian origin and students of nationalities other than India:
- (xi) the years of experience and expertise in the concerned discipline at the command of the Trust; as well as the financial resources;
 - (xii) the system for selection of students to the courses of study at the University; and
- (xiii) status of fulfillment of such other conditions as may be required by the State Government to be fulfilled before the establishment of the University.
- (4) A Screening Committee shall be constituted by the State Government consisting of three member who are Ex-officio members of Karnataka State Higher Education Council to examine the proposals received, which shall make recommendations to the State Government.
- 4. Establishment of the University. (1) Where the State Government, after considering the recommendations of the screening Committee and holding such inquiry as it may deem necessary, is satisfied that.
 - (i) the Trust has the ability to run an University with sufficient infrastructure.
 - (ii) owns a land to the extent specified below in accordance with its location, namely:-
 - (a) twenty five acres of land if it is within limits of Bruhat Bangalore Mahanagara Palike;
 - (b) forty acres of land if it is out side the limits of Bruhat Bangalore Mahanagara Palike but within Bangalore Metropolitan Region Development Authority area;
 - (c) not less than sixty acres of land in the places other than the places specified in clauses (a) and (b).

The land specified above shall consist of a single block and it shall be in the name of concerned trust/institution/ university itself. Based on the furnished particulars required in sub-section (3) of section 3. It may direct the Trust to establish the permanent Stanutory Endowment Fund as specified in section 47.

- (2) After the establishment of the Permanent Statutory Endowment Fund, the State Government and by notification, in the official Gazette, accord sanction for establishment of the University of unitary nature in the State by the name of "Presidency" University".
- (3) The headquarters of the University shall be at Bangalore. The University shall have Campuses or regional Centres, Study Centres anywhere in Kamaraka and subject to the prior parents on of the State Government and as not UCC norms.
- (4) The First Chancellor, the First Vice Chancellor, First members of the Board of Governors. First members of the Board of Management and the Academic Council and all persons who may hereafter become such officers or members, so long as they continue to hold such office or membership, shall constitute a body corporate and can and be sued in the name of the University.
- (5) On sanction for the establishment of the University under sub-nection (2). The land and other movable and immovable properties acquired, created, arranged or built by the Trust for the purpose of the University shall vest in the University.
- (ii) In all suits and other legal proceedings by or against the University, the pleading shall be signed and vertical by, and all processes in such soits and proceedings shall be issued to and be served on the Registrar.
- (7) The land, building and other properties of the University shall not be used for any purpose other than incidental to the objects of the University.
- 5. Grants and Financial Assistance. The University shall be self-linancing and shall be interested a demand nor shall be entitled to any maintenance grant-in-aid or any other financial assistance from the State or any other body or corporation owned or controlled by the State:

Provided that the State may, provide financial support through grants or otherwise,-

- (a) for research, development and other activities for which other State Government organizations are provided financial assistance; or
 - (b) for any specific research or programmes receiving support from the State Government; and
- (c) for the benefit of similar universities in the State whether subject to a change in State policy or otherwise:

Provided that the university may receive any financial support from any other source.

- 6. Power to establish constituent Colleges, additional campuses, Regional Centres or Study Centres. The University may have Constituent Colleges, Regional Centres, additional campuses and Study Centres at such places in the State as it deems fit after the completion of five years after its establishment with prior approval of the State Government subject to norms of UGC and other National Accreditation bodies.
- Objectives of the University. The University shall employ a broad range of strategies to achieve
 its vision and objectives,-
- (i) to support, promote and undertake advancement of and innovation in University education leading up to and including post graduate, doctoral and post doctoral courses in the Business and Management Studies. Life Sciences, Computer Science & Information Technology and other Technical courses. Medical Sciences and affled sectors and make provisions for research, advancement and dissemination of knowledge, including consultancy in these fields;
- (ii) to collaborate with any other universities, research institutions, non-profit organizations, industry associations, professional associations or other organizations, to conceptualize, design, develop and offer specific educational and research programmes, training programmes and exchange programmes for students, faculty members and others:
- (iii) to undertake collaborative research and advocacy with any organizations with prior approval of the State Government;

(ix) to institute degrees, diplomas, certificates and other academic distinctions like award of credits on the basis of successful completion of academic work evaluated through multiple modern methods of assessment;

(x) to disseminate knowledge and develop a public debate on issues of education and allied development fields through seminars, conferences, executive education programmes, community development programmes, publications and training programmes and events;

(xi) to undertake programmes for development and training of faculty and researchers of the University in partnership with any other university of quality with prior approval of the State Government;

(xii) to undertake necessary or expedient action to pursue and promote the objectives of the University;

(xiii) to pursue any objectives as may be approved by the Government for the enhancement of education and other development sectors in India.

- 8. Powers of the University. The University shall have the following powers, namely:-
- (i) to establish and maintain such Campuses, Regional Centres and Study Centres in Kamataka as may be determined by the University from time to time in the manner laid down by the Statutes with prior approval of the Government and as per UGC norms;
- (ii) to carry out all such other activities as may be necessary or feasible in furtherance of the objectives of the University;
- (iii) to confer degrees or other academic distinctions in the manner and under conditions laid down in the Statutes;
- (iv) to institute and award fellowships, scholarships and prizes, awards, medals etc., in accordance with the Statutes;
- (v) to demand and receive such fees, bills, invoices and collect charges as may be fixed by the Statutes or rules, as the case may be;
 - (vi) to make provisions for extracurricular activities for students and employees;
- (vii) to make appointments of the Faculty, officers and employees of the University or a Constituent College, Campuses, Regional Centres, Study Centres:
- to receive voluntary conditions and gifts of any kind not prohibited by any Law for the time being inferce and to acquire, hold, manage, maintain and dispose of any movable or immovable property, including trust and endowment properties for the purpose of the University or a Constituent College or a Campus, Regional Centre, Study Centre:
- (ix) to institute and maintain hostels and to recognize places of residence for students of the University or a Constituent College;
- (x) to supervise and correct the residence and to regulate the discipline among the students and all tategories of employers and to lay down the conditions of service of such employees, including the Code of Conduct for the students and employees;
 - (xi) to create academic, administrative and support staff and other necessary posts;
- (di) to co-operate and collaborate with other Universities in such a manner and for such purposes as the University may determine from time to time,
- 1 (ii) to occurize and conduct refresher courses, orientation courses workshops, seminars and niner courses as a machine, its content of the a cademic main.

(Nav) to actermine standards of admission to the University or a Constituent College Regional Centres. Study Centres with the approval of Academic Council and to make admission of students or Barnataka not less than the extent provided in this Act.

(xv) to do all such other acts or things whether incidental to the powers aforesaid or not, as may be necessary to further the objectives of the University;

(xvi) to institute Degrees, Diplomas, Certificates and other academic distinctions on the basis of examination or any other method of evaluation approved by the Government;

(xvii) to provide for the preparation of instructional materials, including films, cassettes, tapes, video cassettes, CD, VCD and other software and other relevant electronic and print media;

(xviii) to raise, collect, subscribe and borrow money with the approval of the Board of Governors whether on the security of the property of the University, for the purposes of the University;

(xix) to acquire, takeover, and run the management of any other educational institution with the prior approval of the State Government;

(xx) to acquire properties with the prior approval of the Board of Management;

(xxx) to undertake any other activities connected with or incidental to above objectives of the University.

9. University open to all classes, castes, creed, gender or nation. The University admissions shall be open to all persons irrespective of caste, class, creed, gender or nation. All admissions shall be made on the basis of merit in the qualifying examinations:

Provided that forty percent of the admissions in all courses of the university shall be reserved for the students of Karnataka State and admissions shall be made through a Common Entrance Examination conducted by the State Government or its agency and seats shall be allotted as per the merit and reservation policy of the State Government from time to time.

Provided further that where there are less than ten seats in any course like Post Graduate, they shall be reserved by clubbing such courses together and where there are less than three posts in any course they shall be reserved by rotation.

- 10. National Accreditation. The University shall seek accreditation from respective statutory national accreditation bodies soon after its establishment. Further all the courses run by Private Universities shall be as per the regulations of the National Accreditation Bodies.
- 11. Powers of the sponsoring body. The sponsoring body shall have the following powers with reference to the University, each of which may be exercised by the Sponsoring Body at its discretion, namely:
 - (i) to appoint or re-appoint or terminate the appointment of the Chancellor;
 - (ii) to constitute the first Board of Governors of the University;
 - (iii) to nominate the chairperson of the Board of Governors;
 - fiv) to nominate three persons as members of the Board of Governors:
 - (v) to nominate two persons as members of the Board of Management;
 - (vi) to determine the source of funds to be contributed to the University Endowment Fund;
 - (vii) to determine the application and spending of moneys by the University;

12. Officers of the University. - The following shall be the officers of the University, namely:

- (i) The Visitor:

- 13. The Visitor.- (1) His Excellency the Governor of Karnataka shall be the Visitor of the University and the visitor may offer suggestions for the improvement of the functioning of the University.
 - (2) The Visitor shall preside at the convocation of the University for conferring degrees and diplomas.
 - (3) The Visitor shall have the following powers, namely:-
 - (i) to call for any paper or information relating to the affairs of the University:
 - (ii) on the basis of the information received by the Visitor and if he is satisfied that any order, proceedings or decision taken by any authority of the University is not in conformity with the Act, Regulations, or Rules, he may issue such directions as he may deem fit in the interest of the University and the directions so issued shall be complied with, by all the concerned.
- 14. The Pro-Visitor.- (1) The Hon'ble Minister for Higher Education, Government of Karnataka shall be the pro-visitor of the University.-
- (2) The provisitor shall, when the Visitor is absent, preside at the Convocation of the University for conferring degrees and diplomas.
 - 15. The Chancellor,- (1) The Chancellor shall be appointed by the Sponsoring Body.
- (2) The founder trustee of the Sponsoring Body shall be the first Chancellor, who shall hold for life or till he demits office.
- (3) The subsequent Chancellor shall be either the then Trustee of the Sponsoring Body or such other person of eminence of national figure in the field of education, science, culture or public life, when such an appointment is being considered, as may be decided by the Sponsoring Body.
 - (4) The subsequent Chancellor so appointed shall hold the office as determined by the Sponsoring Body.
- (5) The Chancellor shall have such powers as may be conferred on him by this Act or the Statutes made there under, which shall include the following powers, namely:-
 - (i) to function as the head of the University;
 - (ii) to preside at all convocations of the University in absence of visitor and pro-visitor;
 - (iii) to function as a Chairperson of the Board of Governors of the University:
 - (iv) to appoint or re-appoint or terminate the appointment of the Vice-Chancellor, in accordance with the provisions of this Act and the Statutes;
 - (v) to nominate a person as a member of the Nomination Committee as referred to in sub-section(2) of section 16 of this Act;
 - (vi) to preapprove the appointment of the Pro Vice-Chancellor, the Dean, the Registrar and the Finance Officer;
 - (vii) to nominate two academicians as members on the Board of Governors;
 - (viii) to appoint the first Pro Vice-Chancellor and the Finance Officer;
 - to constitute the first Board of Management, the Finance Committee, the Research Council and the Academic Council;
 - (x) to pre-approve the Agenda matters in the manner provided for in the Act;
 - (ai) to resolve a conflict (excluding conflicts at a meeting of the Board of Governors) in the manner provided in this Act.
- (6) in the event of there being a conflict inter-se between the functionary or body and any other functionary or body of the University, then the issue shall be referred to the Chancellor and the decision of the Chancellor in respect of such issue shall be final and binding on the University.
- 16. The Vice-Chancellor. (I) The Vice-Chancellor shall be appointed by the Chancellor for a term of three years primer and conditions as may be laid down by the Chancellos from among three

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persons recommended by the Nomination Committee constituted in accordance with the processus of subsection (2). After the term of three years, it is renewable for another term of these years

Provided that a Vice-chancellor shall continue to hold the office even after expany of his term till new Vice chancellor joins. However, in any case this period shall not exceed one year.

- (2) The Nomination Committee referred to in sub-section (i) shall consist of the following persons, namely:-
 - (t) One person nominated by the Chancellor:
- (ii) Two nominees of the Board of Governors, one of whom shall be nominated as the Convenor of the Committee by the Board of Governors.
- (3) The Nomination Committee shall, on the basis of merit, recommend three persons suitable to hold the office of the Vice-Chancellor and forward the same to the Chancellor along with a concise statement showing the academic qualifications and other distinctions of each person.
- (4) The Vice-Chancellor shall be the Principal Executive and Academic Officer of the University and shall exercise general supervision and control over the allairs of the University and give effect to the decisions of the authorities of the University.

Provided that, where any matter, other than the appointment of a Teacher is of urgent nature requiring immediate action and the same could not be immediately dealt with by any officer or the authority or other body of the University empowered by or under this Act to deal with it, the Vice-Chancellor may take such action as he may deems fit with the prior written approval of the Chancellor.

(5) The Vice-Chancellor shall exercise such other powers and perform such other duties as may be laid down by the Statutes or the Rules.

Provided that, where in the opinion of the Vice-chancellor, any decision of any authority of the university is outside the powers conferred by this Act or Statutes. Regulations or Rules made there under at is likely to be prejudicial to the interests of the University, he shall request the concerned authority to revise its decision within lifteen days from the date of its decision and in case the matherity refuses to revise such decision wholly or parily or fails to take any decision within lifteen days, then such matter shall be referred to the Chancellor and his decision thereon shall be final.

- (6) The services of the Vice-Chanceller can be terminated by the Chanceller with the approval of the Board of Governors after following the principles of natural justice and after providing an opportunity to present his case including for termination on disciplinary grounds.
- [7] The Vice-Chancellor shall preside at the convocation of the University in the absence of the Visitor, Pro-Visitor and the Chancellor.
- 17. The Pro Vice-Chancellor. The Vice-Chancellor shall appoint not exceeding three pro-vice Chancellors with the written approval of the Chancellor in such manner and they shall exercise such powers and perform such duties as may be laid down by the Statutes.
- 18. Deans of faculties.- Deans of faculties shall be appointed by the Vice-Chancellor with the written approval of the Chancellor in such manner and they shall exercise such powers and perform such duties as may be laid down by the Statutes.
- 19. The Registrar.- (1) The Registrar shall be appointed by the Chancellor with the written approval of the Chancellor in such manner and on such terms and conditions as may be laid down by the Statutes.
- (2) All contracts as defined in statutes shall be entered into and signed by the Registrar on behalf of the University.
- (3) The Registrar shall have the power to anthenticate records on behalf of the University and shall exercise such other powers and perform such other duties as may conferred by the statutes or may be required from time to time, by the Chancellor or the Vice-Chancellor.
- [4] The Registrar shall be responsible for the due custody of the records and the common seal of the University and shall be bound to place before the Chancellor, the Vice-Chancellor or any other authority, all such before and documents as demanded.

- 23. The Board of Governors and its powers.- (1) The Board of Governors shall consist of the following, namely:-

- (vi) Two persons nominated by the Sponsoring Body of whom one shall be woman:
- (vii) The Pro Vice-Chancellor who shall be a non-voting member;
- (viii) One entinent educationist nominee of the university grant commission.
- (2) The Registrar shall be non-voting member Secretary of the Board of Governors.
- (3) The tenure of office of the members of the Board of Governors, appointment of members, other than Government nominees, renewal and removal, etc., shall be such as may be laid down by the Statutes.
- (4) All meetings of the Board of Governors shall always be chaired by the Chancellor and in his absence by any one of the nominees of the Chancellor. If Chancellor has not nominated any person to Chair such a meeting, members present in the meeting shall elect the Chairperson for that meeting only from among themselves by a simple majority.
- (5) Quorum for all meetings of the Board of Governors shall be three members attending and voting at such meeting.

Provided that the presence of either the Chancellor or one nominee of the Sponsoring Body and in the absence of the Chancellor or one nominee of Sponsoring Body, the Vice Chancellor, shall always be necessary to form the quorum for any meeting of the Board of Governors.

- (6) The Board of Governors shall be the Principal Governing Body of the University and shall have the following powers, namely:
 - [i] to appoint the Statutory Auditors of the University;
 - (ii) to lay down policies to be pursued by the University;
 - (iii) to review decisions of the other authorities of the University if they are not in conformity with the provisions of this Act, or the Statutes or the Rules;
 - (by) to approve the Euroget and Annual Report of the University;
 - (c) to make now or additional Statutes or amend or repeal the earlier Statutes and Rules:

- (8) The Board of Governors shall meet at such time and place as may be specified by Statute.
- 24. The Board of Management.- [1] The Board of Management shall consist of the following, namely:-
 - (i) The Vice Chancellor:
 - (ii) The Pro-Vice Chancellors;
 - (iii) The Registrar;
 - (iv) Two nominees of the Sponsoring Body;
 - (v) Two Deans of the faculties as nominated by the Vice Chancellor.
- (2) The Vice Chancellor shall be the Chairperson of the Board of Management and the Registrar shall be the Secretary of the Board of Management.
- (3) The Board of management shall be the executive body of the University. The powers and functions of the Board of Management shall be such as may be specified by the statutes.
- (4) All meetings of the Boards of Management shall always be chaired by the Vice Chancellor and in the absence of the Vice Chancellor, by the nominee of the Sponsoring Body and where the Sponsoring Body has not nominated any nominees, then by any other member as elected by the members present in the meeting.
- (5) In the event of a conflict of opinion at a meeting of the Board of Management, the issue shall be referred to the Chancellor and the decision of the Chancellor in respect of such issue shall be final and binding on the University.
 - 25. The Academic Council.- (1) The Academic Council shall consist of the following, namely:-

(i) The Vice-Chancellor - Chairperson

(ii) The Pro Vice Chancellor - Members

(iii) The Registrar - Secretary

(iv) Such other members as may be specified by the Statutes.

(2) The Academic Council shall be the principal academic body of the University and shall, subject to the provisions of this Act, the Statutes, Regulations and the Rules, co-ordinate and exercise general supervision over the academic policies of the University

26. The Research and Innovation Council.- (1) Research and Innovation Council shall be the Principal Research and Innovation Committee of the University and shall provide the larger holistic vision of the kind of research to be undertaken by the University, including prioritization of the research areas. Research and Innovation Council shall, subject to the provisions of this Act, the Statutes, Regulations and the Rules, co-ordinate and exercise general supervision over the Innovation and Research policies of the University.

(2) The Research and Innovation Council shall consist of the following, namely:-

(i) The Vice-Chancellor - Chairperson

(ii) The Pro Vice Chancellor • Member

(iii) The Dean of Research - Secretary

(iv) Head of the Department of Innovation - Member

(v) Deans of all Faculties - Members; and

(iii) Such other members as may be specified in the Statutes.

- (2) The Finance Committee shall be the principal financial body of the University to take care of financial matters and shall, subject to the provisions of the Act, Rules and Statutes or ordinate and exercise general supervision over the financial matters of the University.
- 28. Other Authorities. The constitution, powers and functions of the other authorities of the University shall be such as may be specified by the statutes.
- 29. Disqualification for membership of an Authority or Body: A person shall be disqualified for being a member of any of the Bodies of the University, if he:
 - is of unsound mind and stands so declared by a competent court;
 - (b) is an un discharged insolvent;
 - [c] has been convicted of any offence involving moral turpitude;
 - (d) is conducting or engaging himself in private coaching classes, or
 - (e) has been punished for indulging in or promoting unfair practice in the conduct of any examination, in any form, anywhere.
 - (f) As and when the Spensoring Body were to form an opinion in writing that a Member of any of the authorities or bodies is unfit to hold the post.
- 30. Proceedings not invalidated on account of vacancy. No act or proceedings of any authority of the University shall be invalid merely by reason of the construction of any vacancy or defect in the constitution of the authority.
- 31. Provisions pertaining to Agenda Matters.- (1) No Agenda Matter shall be either included in the Agenda for or taken up for discussion and decided in the meeting of the Board of Governors or the Board of Management or any Committees without obtaining the prior approval of the Chancellor.
- (2) In the event of breach, the Chancellor shall be entitled at all time to immediately take remedial action by reversing all decisions taken by any functionary or body of the University in breach of the provisions of the Act and consequent upon the pursuit of such a remedial action all such actions taken by the functionary or body of the University in breach of the provisions of the Act shall be deemed to be null and void, ab initio and consequently the status quo sute shall provail in respect of the matter or decision in breach.

CHAPTER - V STATUTES AND REGULATIONS

- 32. Statutes.- Subject to the provisions of this Act, the Statutes may provide for any matter relating to the University and staff, as given below, namely:-

 - erration, abolition or restructuring of departments and faculties;
 - full—the manner of co-operation with other Universities or Institutions of higher learning
 - tipe procedure for conformers, or howevery degreess

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- policies in respect of seats in different courses of studies and the procedure of admission of students to such courses;
- (iii) policy relating to the fee chargeable from students for various courses of studies:
- (xii) unstitution of fellowships, scholarships, studentships, free ships, medals and prizes;
- [xiii] any other matters which may be decided by the Board of Governors or required to be provided by statutes under this Act.
- 33. Statutes how made.- (1) The first statutes framed by the Board of Management shall be submitted to the Board of Governors for its approval.
- (2) The Board of Governors shall consider the First Statutes, submitted by the Board of Management, and shall give its approval thereon with such modifications, if any, as it may deem necessary.
- (3) The University shall publish the First Statutes, as approved by the Board of Governors in the University Notification, and thereafter, the First Statutes shall come into force from the date of its publication.
- 34. Power to amend the Statutes.- The Board of Governors may, make new or additional Statutes or amend or repeal the Statutes.
- 35. Regulations.- Subject to the provisions of this Act, the regulations may provide for all or any of the following matters, namely:-
 - (i) admission of students to the University and their enrolment and continuance as such;
- (ii) the courses of study to be laid down for all degrees and other academic distinctions of the University:
 - (iii) the award of degrees and other academic distinctions;
 - [iv] the conditions of the award of fellowships, scholarships, studentships, medals and prizes:
 - (v) the conduct of examinations and the conditions and mode of appointment and duties of examining bodies, examiners invigilators, tabulators and moderators;
 - (vi) the fee to be charged for admission to the examinations, degrees and other academic distinctions of the University;
 - (vii) the conditions of residence of the students at the University or a Constituent College;
 - (vili) maintenance of discipline among the students of the University or a Constituent College;
 - (ix) all other matters as may be provided in the Statutes under the Act.
- 36. Regulations how made.- The Regulations shall be made by the Academic Council and approved by Board of Management.
- 37. Power to amend Regulations.- The Academic Council may, with the approval of the Board of Management, make new or additional regulations or amend or repeal the regulations.
- 38. Fee Regulation Committee.—[1] The fee of the university seats reserved for Karnataka Students under section 9 shall be regulated by the Fee Regulation Committee constituted by the Government which shall be beaded by a retired Supreme Court or High Court Judge and consists of Chancellor. - (3) Any dispute arising out of the contract between the University and an employee shall, be resolved in the maturer provided for in the written contract and in accordance with the Statues.
- 40. Right to appeal.- In case of disciplinary actions by the University against its employee or student, the marrieved employee or students shall have a right to appeal as specified by the statutes.
- 41. Provident or pension fund.—The University shall constitute for the benefit of its employees such provident or pension fund and provide such insurance scheme as it may deem fit in such manner and subject to such conditions as may be specified by the statutes and the laws in force.
- 42. Disputes as to constitution of University authorities and bodies. If any question arises as to whether any person has been duly elected or appointed as, or is entitled to be a member of any authority or other body of the University, the matter shall be referred to the Chancellor whose decision thereon shall be final.
- 43. Constitution of Committees. Any authority of the University mentioned in section 22, shall be empowered to constitute a committee of such authority, consisting of such members of such authority and having such powers as the authority may deem fit.
- 44. Filling of casual vacancies. Any casual vacancy among the members, other than ex-officio members of any Authority or body of the University shall be filled in the same manner in which the member whose vacancy is to be filled up, was chosen, and the person filling the vacancy shall be a member of such authority or body for the residual term for which the person in whose place he would have been a member.
- 45. Protection of action taken in good faith.- No suit or other legal proceedings shall lie against any officer or other employee of the University for anything, which is done in good faith or intended to be done in pursuance of the provisions of this Act, the Statues or the Rules.
- **46. Transitional provisions.-** Notwithstanding anything contained in any other provisions of this Act and the Statues,-
 - (i) the first Vice Chancellor and Pro-Vice-Chancellor, if any shall be appointed by the Chancellor.
 - (ii) the first Registrar and the first Finance Officer shall be appointed by the Chancellor; and
- (iii) the first Board of Management, the first Finance Committee, the first Innovation and Research Council and the first Academic Council shall be constituted by the Chancellor.
- 47. Permanent Statutory Endowment Fund. (1) The University shall establish a Permanent Statutory Endowment Fund of at least rupees twenty five crores out of which at least fifteen crores shall be in cash and remaining in the form of Bank guarantee which may be increased suo moto but shall not be decreased.

Provided that in case of a University outside the Bangalore or Bangalore Rural District at least ten crores must be in form of cash and the remaining five crores shall be in form of Bank Guarantee."

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- (2) The University shall have power to invest the permanent Statutory Endowment Fund in such manner as may be prescribed.
- (3) The University may transfer any amount from the General Fund or the Development Fund to the permanent Statutory Endowment Fund. Excepting in the event of dissolution of the University, in no other circumstances can any montes be transferred from permanent Statutory Endowment Fund for other purposes.
- (4) Seventy five percent of the incomes received from permanent Statutory Endowment Fund shall be used for the purpose of development or general work of the University. The remaining twenty five percent shall be reinvested in the permanent Statutory Endowment Fund.
- 48. University Endowment Fund.- (1) The University shall establish a University Endowment Fund baving such funds as may be determined by the Sponsoring Body which can include donations and other funds received from time to time.
- (2) The Laiversity shall have the power to invest the University Endowment Fund in a manner as any be specified by the Statutes.

- (a) The University Endowment bund is a self-begoed fund that the University desires at maintain voluntarily and invest it responsibly to protest itself from financial challenges that may arise on account of pursuing social objectives and/or unforeseen circumstance.
- (4) The University may transfer any amount from the General Fund or the development fund to the University Endowment Fund. Excepting in the event of dissolution of the University, in no other circumstances can any montes be transferred from the University Endownent Fund for other purposes.
- (5) Eighty percent of the incomes received from the University Endowment Fund shall be used for the purposes of development or general work of the University. The remaining twenty percent shall be reinvested into the University Endowment Fund.
- 49. General Fund. (1) The University shall establish a General Fund to which the following amount shall be credited, namely:-
 - (i) all fees which may be charged by the University;
 - (ii) all sums received from any other source not prohibited by any law for the time being in force;
 - (iii) all contributions made by the University;
 - (iv) all contributions/donations made in this behalf by any other person or body which are not prohibited by any law for the time being in force.
- (2) The funds credited to the General Fund shall be applied to meet all the recurring expenditure of the University.
- 50. Development fund.- [1] The University shall establish a Development Fund to which the following funds shall be credited, namely:-
 - (i) development fees which may be charged from students:
 - (ii) all sums received from any other source for the purposes of the development of the University:
 - all contributions made to the University;
 - (iv) all contributions/donations made in this behalf by any other person or body which are not prohibited by any law for the time being in force; and
 - (v) all incomes received from the Permanent Statutory Endowment Fund.
- (2) The funds credited to the Development Fund from time to time shall be utilized for the development of the University.
- 51. Maintenance of funds.- The funds established under sections 47, 48, 49 and 50 shall, subject to general supervision and control of the Board of Governors, be regulated and maintained in such manner as may be prescribed.
- 52. Annual Report.- (1) The annual report of the University shall be prepared under the direction of the Board of Management and shall be submitted to the Board of Governors for its approval.
- (2) The Board of Governors shall consider the annual report in its meeting and may approve the same with or without modification.
- (3) A copy of the annual report duly approved by the Board of Governors shall be sent to the Visitor and the State Government before 31st December following close of the financial year in 31st March of each year.
- 53. Account and audit.- (1) The annual accounts and balance sheet of the University shall be prepared under the direction of the Board of Management and all funds accruing to or received by the University from all source and all amount disbursed or paid shall be entered in the account maintained by the University.
- [2] The annual accounts of the University shall be audited by an auditor, who is a member of the Institute of Charted Accountants of India, every year.
- (3) A copy of the annual accounts and the balance sheet together with the audit report shall be submitted to the Board of Governors before 30 November following close of the financial year in 81 March of each year.

- 54. Mode of proof of University record. - 55. Power of State Government to issue directions. The State Government may give such directions to the University as in its opinion are necessary or expedient for carrying out the purposes of this Act in to give effect to any of the provisions contained therein or of any rules or orders made thereunder and the Board of Government or the Board of management, as the case may be, of the University shall comply with every such direction.
- 56. Penalties.- (I) Whoever contravenes the provisions of this Act or the rules made thereunder or any examination matters or in matters relating to award of degrees or in giving marks cards shall on conviction be pumishable with fine of rupees fifty thousand which may extend to ten lakhs rupees or with an imprisonment for a term of six months which may extend to two years or with both.

Provided that, where the University is also involved the permission letter granted under this Act to commence the University shall be withdrawn.

- [2] A penalty under this section may be imposed without prejudice to the penalty specified in any other Act.
- 57. Power to enter and inspect. Any officer not below the rank of Group 'A officer authorised by the State Government in this behalf, shalf, subject to such conditions as may be specified therein under the Karnataka Educational Institutions (Prohibition of Capitation Fee) Act, 1984 (Karnataka Act 37 of 1984) shall be deemed to be the Officer authorized to exercise the same powers and discharge the same functions as provided under section 9 of that Act for the purposes of this Act.
- 58. Power to give direction for dissolution of the University.- (1) If the University proposes dissolution in accordance with the law governing its constitution or incorporation, it shall give at least six months prior notice in writing to the Government.
- (2) The Kamataka State Higher Education Council shall conduct periodical Inspection of University regarding:
 - (i) Standard of Instructions for grant of degree;
 - (ii) Quality of Education;
 - (iii) Avoidance of commercialisation of Higher Education;
 - (iv) contravention of the provisions of the Act if any;

- (3) On identification of mismanagement, maladministration and indiscipline, the Government shall issue directions to the management of the University to set right the administration. If the direction is not followed within such time as may be prescribed, the right to take decision for winding up of the University or any course thereof shall vest with the Government.
- (4) The manner of winding up of the University or any course thereof—shall be such as may be prescribed by the Government in this behalf.

Provided that no such action shall be initiated without affording a reasonable opportunity to show cause to the University

- (5) On receipt of the notice referred to in sub-section (1), the Government shall, in consultation with the relevant Regulatory Authority make such arrangements for administration of the University from the proposed date of dissolution of the University or winding up of the course and until the last batch of students in regular courses of studies of the University complete their courses of studies in such manner as may be specified by the Statues.
- 58. Expenditure of the University during dissolution.-(i) The expenditure of administration of the University during—taking over period of its management under sub-section (5) of section 58 shall be then out of the Permanent Statutory Endowment Fund, the General Fund or the Development Fund in such manner as any be prescribed.

- (2) If the fund referred to in section 47–45–49 and 50 are not sufficient to meet the expenditure of the University during the taking over period of its management, such expenditure may be meetly disposing of the properties or asset of the University, by the Government.
- (3) Where the dissolution of the University is due to mismanagement or maladministration, the Government is at liberty to identify the persons responsible for such mismanagement or maladministration and to impose penalty as it doesns fit.
- 60. Removal of difficulties. (1) If any difficulty arises in giving effect to the provisions of this Act, the State Government may, by a notification or by order, make such provisions, which are not inconsistent with the provisions of this Act, as appear to it to be necessary or expedient, for removing the difficulty:

Provided that, no notification or order under this section shall be made after the expiry of a period of five years from the date of commencement of this Act.

- (2) Every Order made under sub-section (1), shall, as soon as may be after it is made, be laid before the State Legislature.
- 61. Power to make rules by the State Government.- (1) The State Government may make rules, by notification, to carry out the purposes of this Act.
- (2) Every rule made under this Act shall be laid as soon as may be after it is made before each House of the State Legislature while it is in session for a total period of thirty days which may be comprised in one session or in two or more successive sessions, and if, before the expiry of the session immediately following the session or the successive sessions aforesaid, both Houses agree in making any modification in the rule or both Houses agree that the rule should not be made, the rule shall thereafter have effect only in such modified form or be of no effect, as the case may be, so however, that any such modification or annulment shall be without prejudice to the validity of anything previously done under that rule.

Legal Education Committee at its meeting held on 22nd October, 2016 considered the inspection report of Presidency School of Law, Presidency University, Bangalore. After consideration, Committee made the following recommendations:

The Committee considered the inspection report submitted by the inspection team. After consideration, Committee is of the view that as per Section 7 [1] (i) of the Advocates Act, 1961, Presidency University, Bangalore, Karnataka be granted recognition for the purpose of conferring the degree of law for imparting five year BCom, LLB (Hons.) and also fresh approval of affiliation to its Presidency School of Law, Presidency University, Bangalore, Karnataka for running five year B.Com.LLB(Hons) course with an intake of two sections of 60 students in each section for a period of two years i.e. for the academic year 2016-2017 and 2017-2018 subject to the following conditions.

Further Presidency School of Law, Presidency University, Bangalore, Karnataka be granted one additional section in five year BA-LLB (Hons) course and one additional section in five year BBA.LLB(Hons) course from the year 2016-17.

Since, the university wants to start Hons, degree for five year B.Com LLB course. They must follow the Rules in this regard. The relevant rule i.e. Rule-4, Schedule II of the rules of Legal Education 2008 which has to be complied by the university is quoted herein Rule - 4, Schedule II

"(b) For specialized and / or honors course, a student has to take not less than thirty eight papers in all, which shall include twenty compulsory papers, four clinical papers, six optional papers and eight papers in specialized/honors course in any Group as stipulated below. However if eight papers are taken from multiple of groups, honors can be given in general law without mentioning any specialization.

Example: "A" has taken eight honors papers selected as follows: two from Constitutional Law, three from Business Law, one from International Law and two from International Trade Law, his Honors shall be in Law. "B" takes eight papers from Constitutional Law group, his honors shall be mentioned in Constitutional Law."

- Construct more class rooms and appoint teachers for subsequent years according to the strength of students.
- College should ensure the payment of salary to teachers as per Rules 22 schedule III, Part IV of BCI Rules.
- The institution is directed to upgrade the library as mentioned 3. below :-

"Today with the increasing cost of journals, books, wifi, elibrary and online facilities including LT. facilities, the minimum investment by each university should be Rs. 10 lakhs for each year. However any university/deemed university in rural area, it should be Rs. 5 Lakh and for all other affiliated colleges in the urban area it should be Rs. 2 lakhs and in rural area Rs. 1 lakh."

- The institution is also directed to upgrade the library by subscribing 10 sets of Indian Bar Review, selected judgments and professional Ethics published by Bar Council of India Trust.
- The institution is also directed to upgrade the library by 5. subscribing 10 sets of Indian Bar Review, selected judgments and professional Ethics published by Bar Council of India Trust.
- Teacher Student ratio shall be as per Schedule-III, Rule-11; 6. Clause-17, Part-IV of Bar Council of India Rules.
- College Management should establish a computer lab for the 7. development of Law students.

College is directed to inform the timings of the classes

Purther, the college must specify the timing of the college which has not been given. College should also maintain the timing which has to be minimum 5 1/2 hours with half an hour break. College to file an affidavit to the Bar Council of India within six weeks mentioning the timing of the classes. The relevant rules are quoted hereunder :-

Rule (axiii), Chapter I

"(mill) "Regular Course of Study" means and includes a course which runs for at least five hours a day continuously with an additional half an hour recess every day and running not less than thirty hours of working schedule per week."

L.J. 2015, L.I.C. 2015, AJR Civil Cases 2015, AJR Law Lines 2015, AIR Cheque Dishonour Reports 2015, AIR Accident Claims and compensation 2015, Institution shall get electronic versions updated every year by AIR Pvt. Ltd. Central Acts and Local Acts, Criminal law journal, SCC, Company cases, Indian Bar Review, selected Judgements on Professional Ethics and Journals with the back volumes for at least ten years and also such number of text books in each subjects taught during the period according to the minimum standard ratio of ten books for each registered students. For running integrated program, text books of such other subjects are also to be kept in the similar minimum ratio.

Further, the institution should follow the attendance rule and file reply that they are going to follow the aforesaid rule. The next inspection team must see whether the said rule is being followed by the university or not. The relevant Rule 12 is given below:

#12. End Semester Test: No student of any of the degree program shall be allowed to take the end semester test in a subject if the student concerned has not attended minimum of 70% of the classes held in the subject concerned as also the most court room exercises, tutorials and practical training conducted in the subject taken together.

Provided that if a student for any exceptional reasons fall to attend 70% of the classes held in any subject, the Dean of the University or the Principal of the Centre of Legal Education, as the case may be, may allow the student to take the test if the student concerned attended at least 65% of the classes held in the subject concerned and attended 70% of classes in all the subjects taken together. The similar power shall rest with the Vice Chancellor or Director of a National Law University, or his authorized representative in the absence of the Dean of Law.

Provided further that a list of such students allowed to take the test with reasons recorded be forwarded to the Bar Council of India."

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Bridge and Remedial coaching

Steps for improving the performance of the students who are academically weak:

BoE Decision (20-2-2018):

As per the result analysis, it was observed that some courses of School of Engineering, the percentage of failed students is above 15%. BoE had a detailed discussion on the ways to improve these students' performance and helped them earning the required credits. In the detailed discussion, it was decided to conduct the remedial / extra classes for the lateral entry admitted students especially in Mathematics and some other courses in which students performed badly. Chairperson suggested the Dean, School of Engineering to plan the schedule for remedial / extra classes from next academic year.

As per the Board of Examinations' (BoE) decision, based on the performance of students in the Test 1/ Test 2 / Mid Term and Final Term End Examinations, the courses are selected for remedial/ extra classes. The Remedial sessions are scheduled preferably in holidays and after working hours. This remedial classes are organized to clarify doubts, re-explaining of critical topics for improving performance. As the part of continuous evaluations Tutorials, Assignments, Quizzes are conducted regularly.

Make-Up Examinations is a provision for a student to complete a Course (or Courses) where she/he received an "F" grade (Fail), or, was given the place holder grade "I" (due to medical exigencies, specifically hospitalization, trauma or contagious disease only) to reappear in the End Term Final Examination component of a Course (or Courses), subject to the conditions mentioned in Clauses 14.2 to 14.5, of the Academic Regulations, 2017.

The Summer Term is an additional Academic Term that may be offered during the summer break, typically for about eight (08) weeks during June-July. A student may re-register for the concerned Course(s), if offered, in which the student had received the placeholder grade "NP" (only one "NP" grade in the concerned Semester), "NE" (Not Eligible) and "F" (Fail) in the earlier Semesters, to complete the concerned Course(s) and earn the required credits. The Course(s) offered in the Summer Term are delivered in a shorter term of about 8 weeks (with a minimum of thirty teaching days). However, the total number of contact hours for these Courses are as per the Course Credit Structure. The Course Contents/Syllabus and the continuous assessments and evaluation patterns for these Course(s) also remain the same as that prescribed by the concerned Program Regulations and Curriculum.



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School of Management

School of Management, Presidency University, strives to prepare students to be quality managers and entrepreneurs who are ready to face the dynamic and challenging business environment, by equipping them with right knowledge, skills and attitude. In this regard it endeavours to take all students together including the weaker students. The following are some of the measure adopted by the School, to bring weaker students on par with those who are excellent:

1. Remedial Coaching:

Starting from Academic Year 2018-19, the School of Management will conduct remedial classes on working Saturdays beyond the usual university working hours for students who are deemed academically weak on the recommendation of the faculty instructor.

2. Bridge Course:

As students seeking admission to MBA program are from diverse academic backgrounds, a bridge course is being planned to be conducted to enable students to improve their understanding in core subjects that relate to the MBA program. SOM would organise the bridge course spanning over 2-3 days at the beginning of the first semester, for new students of MBA program 2018-20 onwards. This would be open to all students admitted to the program.

3. Special Summer Term:

Students with an internal assessment score less than 40% (NP grade), students who fall short of the mandatory classroom attendance (NE grade), and students who have received lower grades and wish to improve their CGPA, in order to enable them to successfully complete the program, are provided with an additional academic term spanning over a maximum of 8 weeks, during the summer break (at the end of the IV semester of the MBA program). A student can register for the summer term for a maximum 3 courses with a limit of 6 credits. The summer term is followed by an examination.

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International Students Admission Policy

- 1. Introduction: These rules define the procedure for the admission of International students to various courses. These rules are based on General Guidelines issued by the University Grants Commission (UGC), Association of Indian Universities (AIU) and Statutory / Regulatory directives issued from time to time.
- 2. The Cell: The International Students Cell will provide necessary guidance for admission. All letters relating to international students should be addressed to the Office of International relations of the Institution.

3. International Students:

- i. Foreign students: Students holding passports issued by foreign countries including people of Indian origin who have acquired the nationality of foreign countries.
- ii. Non Resident Indians (NRI): Only those Non Resident Indian students who have studied and passed the qualifying examinations from schools or colleges in foreign countries will be included as international students. This will include the students studying in the schools or colleges situated in foreign countries even if affiliated to the Boards of Secondary Higher Secondary Education or Universities located in India, but will not include students studying in those schools or colleges (situated in India) and affiliated to the Boards of Secondary Higher Secondary Education or Universities of foreign countries. Students passing the qualifying examinations from Boards or Universities located in foreign countries as external students and Dependants of NRI studying in India will not merit the status of international students.

Entry level status of International students on entry to the country will be maintained.

4. Documents required for admission of International Students:

i. Visa: All the international students will require a student visa endorsed to this Institution for joining full time courses. No other endorsement is acceptable. Students wishing to join a research

programme will require a research visa endorsed to this Institution. The visa should be valid for the prescribed duration of the course. Visa is not required for NRI students.

- ii. All international students wishing to undertake any research work or join a Ph.D programmes will have to obtain prior security clearance from the Ministry of Home Affairs and the approval of Department of Secondary & Higher Education, Ministry of Human Resource Development Government of India.
- 5. Eligibility Qualifications: Only students having qualification recognized as equivalent by the Association Of Indian Universities (AIU) are only eligible for admission.
- i. A candidate shall have completed 17 years of age on or before 31st December
- ii. Candidates seeking admission to Medical program must have studied the subjects of Physics, Chemistry, Biology and English in Grades 11 & 12.
- iii. Under this category only the students who have studied and passed the qualifying examination from a school located in foreign country shall be considered. This will include the student studying in school and / or college situated in foreign country, even if the concerned school / college is affiliated to any Board of secondary Higher Secondary education or a University in India. However, wards of NRI / PIO / FN, who is studying for the qualifying examination in school / college located in India are excluded.
- iv. In case of any school that follows the American system of education, the candidate must have studied Physics, Chemistry and Biology at "AP" (Advanced Placement) level and must have minimum C grade in these subjects.
- v. The candidate shall get equivalence certificate from the Association of Indian University (AIU), New Delhi.

Equivalence Certificate:

For issue of Equivalence Certificate, US \$ 200 or equivalent Indian currency payable through Demand Draft favouring "Association of Indian Universities, New Delhi" is required. For prescribed application form to be submitted to the Association of Indian Universities, New Delhi" refer Annexuer II.

6. Admission Procedure: Admission of all the international students will be done through the Institution International Students' Cell. Students will be admitted in the beginning of the course.

A student wishing to join the University should submit application form (Annexure I) to the International Student's Cell along with the prescribed fees. The Cell will then check the eligibility and issue the provisional admission letter. This is required to get the visa and to complete other formalities. After getting provisional admission, the student should get the student visa and complete all other formalities.

The student then report for final admission, fills up the admission form and pay the required fees. The student should undergo the medical examination & also required to appear for the English proficiency test. Once this is done, the final admission is given.

The international students will have to pay the fees in US dollars. In special cases, payment of fees in the equivalent Indian Rupees may be considered. Following fees are applicable to secure provisional admission.

Processing Fee: US\$ 100 Eligibility Fee and Administrative Fee: US \$ 200

In case a student is not considered for admission to the course after obtaining provisional admission, the administrative fees will be refunded after deducting US\$ 75 towards the bank commission and postage.

- 7. Change of Course: An international student who has been granted admission to a particular course shall not be allowed to change the course during its currency. Transfer from one institution in India to another is not allowed.
- 8. Summary: Procedure for admission is summed up below:
- Step 1: Students should purchase the International Student's Bulletin (including the eligibility form) and the prospectus of the University. This information is also available on the website.
- Step 2: Fill up the eligibility form for international students and submit it, along with the copies of certificates listed in the eligibility form and the required fees. This should be done well in time so that the student is able to obtain the visa and NOC before the due date for admission.
- Step 3: Get the provisional admission letter from the International Students Cell, in order to obtain the student visa.
- Step 4: Produce the document of provisional admission to the Indian Embassy in the respective country and get a student visa endorsed to institution. NRI students do not require a visa.
- Step 5: Report to the institution for admission. Fill the permanent admission form and submit it along with the following documents (in original along with a xerox copy):
- Step 6: Obtain a bonafide certificate from authorized official of the Institution by submitting copy of the passport and a valid student visa endorsed to institution. The bonafide certificate will be issued with FSIS number allotted by FRRO of the city where the institution is located. The

bonafide certificate issued by the Institution to be submitted to FRRO to obtain residential permit.

FSIS number will be allotted to a foreign student on submission (online) of required details in the FRRO website (to be logged in with instructions user-id & password)

- a. Mark / Grade Statement of the qualifying examination
- b. Transfer / Scholl leaving Certificate from the Institute last attended,
- c. Nationality Certificate in case of N. R. I / P.I.O / F. N. Nationality Certificate of Guardian in case of P. I. O
- d. A xerox copy of their passport duly attested by a notary.
- e. Physical fitness certificate from a registered Physician
- f. Certificate from the owner/ Head of the Institute starting the length of service & Total emoluments if guardian if in service in foreign country,
- g. Income certificate from competent authority, in case the guardian is self employed.
- h. Supporting documents for present residential address in India (where the institution is located)

Note: The original certificates will be returned to the students immediately after making necessary endorsements.

- Step 6: Undergo medical examination and obtain medical fitness certificate. As per government rules all international students entering India on student visa have to be tested for HIV and will not be given admission if found to be positive. All international students will be required to pay medical fees of US \$ 50, which includes the medical insurance cover for the first year. For subsequent years the medical insurance fees will be same as for other Indian students and is included in yearly fees.
- Step 7: Appear for the proficiency test in English. This is only applicable, if the qualifying examination is not in the English medium.
- Step 8: Admission of international students will be confirmed only after verification of original certificates, medical fitness test and payment of required fees.
- Step 9: Within a week of arrival in India, register with the police in the Foreigner Regional Registration Office (FRRO) of the local Police.
- 9. Discipline: The international students will abide by all the rules of the Institution and the code of conduct as applicable to Indian students doing same courses.

10. Examination and Award of Degrees & Diplomas:

The procedure for examination, payment of examination fees, issue of mark list, issue of passing certificates and award of degrees will be same as for the Indian students doing same courses.

11. Conclusion: In case there are any differences in the interpretation of rules, opinion of the International Students Cell will be final. The fees are liable to revision and students will have to pay the revised fees as and when applicable. On the points not specifically covered, the decision of the Institution authorities will be final.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Presidency University has made rapid strides towards excellence in education. Our faculty strength has crossed 150 this Academic Year (2017-18). It is necessary to have a Faculty Appraisal and Development System (FADS) to nurture and establish a "Performance Culture" that will enable all faculty members to actualize their potential and collectively establish Presidency University as a model of academic excellence.

The objectives of FADS is to "Enable" faculty members to contribute towards the University's goals and growth and "Align" their individual goals with the Vision and objectives of the University, "Measure" performance and facilitate "Progression". The scope of FADS is for performance evaluation of the academic faculty members only and applicable for the Academic Year.

FADS is designed as a "Scorecard" which enables "Quantitative" and "Qualitative" measures of performance. The Scorecard incorporates the main responsibility areas of the faculty that are aligned with the University Vision and Mission, and, other objectives vis-à-vis UGC, NAAC, NIRF and such regulatory bodies/assessments. The structure of this Scorecard is based on three main responsibility areas of all faculty members — Teaching, Research and Institution Building. Activities within these areas are elaborated and "Quantified" as "Units". The levels of faculty are also factored in. Self-goals of the faculty are included as options to empower faculty to choose their areas of contribution. The sum total of these activities constitutes the "Quantitative" record of performance. The "Qualitative" measures, and, an evaluation by a Committee constituted by the VC/Chancellor. The "Qualitative" performance is measured in "Marks". The Quantitative "Units" are mapped to "Marks" and a combined performance measure in "Marks" is done based on weightages given to the "Quantitative" and "Qualitative" components. Based on the total Marks, a Grade is assigned as an indicator of the level of performance. This forms the basis for rewards and progression.

1.0 OBJECTIVES

Presidency University is committed to move on the path of excellence with a clear vision for quality of education, research and social outreach. The image of any academic institution is determined by the quality of its faculty, their research, academic achievements and contribution to society. Therefore, it is necessary to periodically review faculty performance to ensure the following:

The Faculty continuously benchmark against the best in the world and set high

standards of teaching and research.

The University rewards high performers and motivates under performers. $\hfill\square$

Presidency University FADS is designed to enable and exhort the faculty members to perform academic work of their choice within a transparent and robust framework to ensure that the contributions of every faculty member are aligned with the University's Vision and Goals.

FADS will be applicable for a given Academic Year.

The Presidency University FADS is a multidimensional appraisal and assessment system, taking into account:

- 2.1 Major responsibilities and contributions of the faculty which are categorized under three critical areas: Teaching, Research and Institution Building. These are referred to as Category 1, 2 and 3 respectively. This is the First Dimension.
 - 2.2 The Second Dimension is the Performance and Output with respect to the "Grade/Level" of the Faculty Assistant Professor, Associate Professor, Professor and Dean.
- 2.3 The Third Dimension Self-chosen KRAs/Self-Goals of each faculty member. These are aligned to the three Categories. This is a significant enabler for a faculty member to contribute from his / her strengths and capacity and aligned to the University's Objectives.
- 2.4 Guidelines for Performance Areas, Measurement and associated Weightages are adapted from NAAC and UGC guidelines, where relevant. These have been customized to create a unique system that best fits the Presidency University context and objectives.
- 2.5 A Scorecard is designed to measure the Quantitative performance in Units, which is then converted to "Marks" and aggregated with the Qualitative assessment scores in "Marks" to obtain an overall performance Score.
 - 2.6 The Quantitative assessment is by way of the Scorecard. The qualitative aspect of measurement is by way of:
 - Student Feedback
- 2.6.2 Self-appraisal by the concerned Faculty Member and appraisal by the Dean in a personal interaction.
- 2.6.3 Independent appraisal by the Vice-Chancellor/Chancellor Evaluation Committee.
- 2.7 The overall performance score (marks) is mapped to a Grade.

4.0 RECOMMENDED GUIDELINES: WORK NORMS AND EXPECTED MINIMUM OUTPUT

Minimum performance/output expected from a faculty member, based on the "level" of the concerned faculty member, in an Academic Year is specified in Table II.

The minimum work output in the three basic functions – Teaching, Research and Institution Building is specified for the various Faculty Levels. The guidelines for minimum investment for Self-Goals provide the flexibility to earn the recommended UNITS from areas of strength / interest / development as decided by each faculty.

The UGC Guidelines are used for teaching load allocations (except for a slightly lighter load on the Professor given the context). The working time requirements for faculty as specified by UGC is taken as the reference. The BASELINE for TIME: 180 Academic Days X 8 Hours per day = 1440 Hours.

Guidelines are provided in Table II for time investment (in %) from the faculty member.

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Note: The Minimum Units in Teaching (Category 1) is mandatory. Any exceptions must be recommended by the Dean for approval of the Vice Chancellor.

Table II specifies the minimum output in terms of Units required by each level of faculty member. These Units are converted to "Marks" (refer Table I) which is the "Quantitative" measure.

The "Qualitative" measures (Student Feedback, Self-Appraisal with HOD/Dean Evaluation, VC/Chancellor Evaluation Committee), as applicable, along with the corresponding weightages used to calculate the final total score is shown in Table III. This further leads to the grading for each level which is shown in Table IV.

Faculty members are very strongly advised to endeavour to achieve B or A grades to build a strong "Performance Culture". Grade C implies that the performance is not at par with acceptable standards. Grade D implies very poor performance.

7.0 END CLAUSES

The above norms are means to facilitate individual faculty members to plan and regulate their own activities and also assess their performance in quantitative terms. The intent of these norms is not to control any faculty members but to help and guide activities of individuals as well as those of the similar academic activities. It is expected that every care must be taken in operationalizing the guidelines contained in this document so as to achieve University in a manner so that work goes on smoothly through balanced and coordinated participation of every member. The units have been assigned on the basis of expected time required to be devoted for the performance of the academic activities and also to avoid double accounting for the same /

- 7.1 Academic activities for which unit equivalence has not been worked out, in such cases units shall be finalized by a duly constituted Dean's Committee and shall be approved by the Vice-Chancellor whenever such need arises.
- 7.2 The appraisal of Faculty members who are designated as Controller of Examinations, Registrar, Dy. Registrar, Assistant Registrar, Officer on Special Duty (OSD), etc. will not come under this system of evaluation as these are full time academic administrative activities.
- of interpretation, the Chancellor may take a decision, after obtaining necessary recommendations of a Committee consisting of any or all the Deans 7.3 Notwithstanding anything stated in this document, for any unforeseen issues arising, not covered by this document, or in the event of differences of the Schools and the Vice Chancellor. The decision of the Chancellor shall be final.
- 7.4 The FADS SCORECARD / Faculty Appraisal and Development System (FADS) document may be subject to review after every three years.

1 SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

a BASIS FOR PREPARATION OF ACCOUNTS

The accounts are prepared under the Historical Cost Convention unless otherwise stated and generally on the Accrual method of accounting.

b REVENUE RECOGNITION

Fees from Students (except Tuition Fees), Sale of Admission Forms, Royalty and Interest on Savings 8ank account are accounted on cash basis. Tuition Fees collected separately for each semester is accounted on accrual basis. Income from Land, Buildings and Other Property and Interest on Investments are accounted on accrual basis.

c FIXED ASSETS AND DEPRECIATION

Fixed assets are stated at cost of acquisition including inward freight, duties and taxes and incidental and direct expenses related to acquisition, installation and commissioning

Infrastructure constructed under work order contracts are capitalised when substandial work is completed and virtual completion of the project is obtained from the Architect

Fixed assets are valued at cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation on fixed assets is provided on written down value method, at the following rates

Assets, the Individual value of each of which is Rs. 2000 or less (except Library Books) are treated as Small Value Assets, 100% depreciation is provided in respect of such assets at the time of their acquisition

Interest on borrowed money allocated to and utilized for qualifying assets, pertaining to the period up to the date of capitalization is capitalized. Assets acquired on finance lease is capitalised at the gross value and interest there on is charged to Income Statement.

Advances paid towards acquisition of fixed assets outstanding as of each Balance Sheet date and the cost of fixed assets not ready for use before such date are disclosed under capital work in progress. Lease payements under operating lease are recognized as an expense in the Income Statement

Payment for lease hold land is amortised over the period of lease.



d RETIREMENT BENEFITS

Retirement benefits i.e., gratuity and leave encashment are provided on the basis of actuarial valuation. The Actual payments of Gratuity and Leave encashment are debited in the Accounts to the respective provisions.

e USE OF ESTIMATES

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP) requires managements to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of a Accounting Policies and reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income and expenditure and disclosure of contingent liabilities on the date of the Balance Sheet. Actual results could differ from those estimates. Estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Any revision to accounting estimates is recognized prospectively in current and future periods.

BORROWING COST CAPITALISATION

Borrowing costs are interests and other costs incurred by the sponsoring body on behalf of the University in connection with the borrowing of funds. The funds are used for the purpose of developing infrastructure and purchase of fixed assets for the University and for operating expenses. Borrowing costs directly attributable to construction or acquisition of those fixed assets which essentially take substantial period of time to get ready for their intended use are capitalised. Other borrrowing costs are expensed in the period in which these are incurred.

R PROVISION AND CONTINGENCIES

A provision is recognized when the Institution has a present obligation as a result of past events and it is probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation, in respect of which reliable estimate can be made. Provisions (excluding retirement benefits) are not discounted to its present value and are determined based on best estimate required to settle the obligation at the balance sheet date. These are reviewed at each balance sheet date and adjusted to reflect the current best estimate. Contingent habilities are not recognized but disclosed in the notes to the financial statements.

h ACCOUNTING FOR LEASES

Assets acquired under leases where a significant portion of the risk and rewards of ownership are retained by the lessor are classified as operating leases. Lease rentals are charged to the income and Expenditure on accrual basis.



Notes to Accounts

1 SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

BASIS FOR PREPARATION OF ACCOUNTS

The accounts are prepared under the Historical Cost Convention unless otherwise stated and generally on the Accrual method of accounting.

b REVENUE RECOGNITION

Fees from Students (except Tultion Fees), Sale of Admission Forms, Royalty and Interest on Savings Bank account are accounted on cash basis. Tultion Fees collected separately for each semester is accounted on accrual basis. Income from Land, Buildings and Other Property and Interest on Investments are accounted on accrual basis.

FIXED ASSETS AND DEPRECIATION

Fixed assets are stated at cost of acquisition including inward fraight, duties and taxes and incidental and direct expenses related to acquisition, installation and commissioning

Fixed assets are valued at cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation on fixed assets is provided on written down value method, at the following rates

Assets, the individual value of each of which is Rs. 2000 or less (except Library Books) are treated as Small Value Assets, 100% depreciation is provided in respect of such assets at the time of their acquisition

d RETIREMENT BENEFITS

Retirement benefits i.e., gratuity and leave encashment are provided on the basis of actuarial valuation.

The Actual payments of Gratuity and Leave encashment are debited in the Accounts to the respective provisions.

e USE OF ESTIMATES

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP) requires managements to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of a Accounting Policies and reported amounts of assets, ilabilities, income and expenditure and disclosure of contingent liabilities on the date of the Balance Sheet. Actual results could differ from those estimates. Estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Any revision to accounting estimates is recognized prospectively in current and future periods.

BORROWING COST CAPITALISATION

Borrowing costs are interests and other costs incurred by the sponsoring body on behalf of the University in connection with the borrowing of funds. The funds are used for the purpose of developing infrastructure and purchase of fixed assets for the University and for operating expenses. Borrowing costs directly attributable to construction or acquisition of those fixed assets which essentially take substantial period of time to get ready for their intended use are capitalised. Other borrrowing costs are expensed in the period in which these are incurred.

g PROVISION AND CONTINGENCIES

A provision is recognized when the institution has a present-obligation as a result of past events and it is probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation, in respect of which reliable estimate can be made. Provisions (excluding retirement benefits) are not discounted to its present value and are determined based on best estimate required to settle the obligation at the balance sheet date. These are reviewed at each balance sheet date and adjusted to reflect the current best estimate. Contingent liabilities are not recognized but disclosed in the notes to the financial statements.

h ACCOUNTING FOR LEASES

Assets acquired under leases where a significant portion of the risk and rewards of ownership are retained by the fessor are classified as operating leases. Lease rentals are charged to the income and Expenditure on accrual basis.

Any deviation from the scheduled plan must have a prior approval from the VGST. A sample copy of the Utilization Certificate is enclosed for information and necessary action in the future.

Future releases of grants will be based on satisfactory project performance. The funding agency has the right to terminate the project, if it is found to be not

satisfactorily pursuing and fulfilling the stated project goals and objectives. Any unspent balance must be returned back to the funding agency within 60 days following the conclusion of the project. Any publications or other dissemination arising from research supported by VGST grants should be acknowledged.
