#### Helping Students Soar

Basking in the success of Invincia, the grand University Fest in the last week of May 2022, the charismatic Professor and Assistant Dean of the Department of Student Affairs, Dr. Anu Sukhdev was busy as usual in her office when I met her for this interview. The normally bustling office was relatively quiet, understandably so after the students pulled out all the stops and left no stone unturned to make the Fest a grand success. It was time for them to get back to their academic rigour after some much needed bonding and bonhomie.

#### From academics to administration, I asked Dr Anu how she saw the change.

Dr. Anu began her career as a teacher at Presidency School in RT Nagar and has been with Presidency University since its inception in 2015. Juggling academia and administration is nothing new to this veteran academic, as she was the Head of the first year programme, SOE and also the Head of the Department of Chemistry. Sensing the need to strengthen science education in this part of the country, Dr. Anu moved swiftly to set up the Chemistry lab at the University and also facilitated research and development at the department.



Dr. Anu's stint as a cultural coordinator in a previous organization stood her in good stead as she put these wide-ranging skills to good use in her current role as the Assistant Dean at DSA, interacting and inspiring students to take on higher challenges and bigger responsibilities. Dr. Anu has seen the growth of the DSA right from the time it was set up in 2017 at PU. She has organised events like Independence Day, Founder's Day, Ethnic Day to name a few throughout the year and these extracurricular learnings gave her the confidence to manage and mentor a large population of students.

#### How does the Department of Student Affairs impact students in the long run?

The DSA is a microcosm of the world at large as students plan, organise, brainstorm, discuss and then execute the various activities. This real-time authentic experience helps them to transfer the much needed skills like cooperation, collaboration, team building, confidence to undertake tasks, time management, stress management to the real world as they step into their careers and that is great learning for the students who actively participate in the various tasks at DSA.

#### What changes have you brought in during your watch? What else can be done to strengthen the DSW?

The activities of the clubs are more streamlined now and there is a robust tracking system with a faculty in charge of each club. This season alone saw over 100 activities that included workshops and cultural events. She has identified talented students in diverse clubs and sent them to participate in tournaments across the country. The success of Invincia has whetted the appetite of the students and they are raring to replicate the grand run. DSA has hired professionals who can guide the students in events like fashion shows, dance, music, music, presenting, and the like. There is constant activity going on in 30+ clubs at any point of time.

Notable is the fact that 3000 out of the 4500 students in the current crop of first years are currently registered in the numerous clubs.

#### Do you think young people are capable of handling things on their own, or should there be constant monitoring by adults?

The 40-member team that carried the entire University fest on their young shoulders went through an intense learning process. The support and trust extended by the Vice President, Mr. Salman Ahmed, helped the youngsters give their best.

#### What is Dr. Anu like as a person?

Communicate-Keep the channels open at all times. A leader should be open to suggestions and should take the team along. Only then can success be assured. Dr. Anu attributes her ability to communicate as a key skill that has brought her this far.

Work towards keeping the flock together, taking them along, gaining confidence, meeting deadlines and achieving your goals.



### Placement Updates

The University's Placement Cell connects students with potential employers and offers a variety of student-friendly programmes such as career guidance, counselling, professional development, and training. The Cell has a good record of helping students bag placements and also ensures students ease into their first jobs, thus helping students to jumpstart their careers.

The Placement team has taken the August to December 2021 placement tempo forward by placing 539 students, taking the total from 1359 to 1898 during January–March 2022. Prime recruiters during the period have been

## Looking for 'Likes': Teens' Social Media Addiction

Contrary to what many people think, social media actually has a negative effect on teens. It is a medium of communication shared by all age groups, ranging from children to adults, especially teens. Social media is sometimes helpful, entertaining and within the reach of the general public. Sadly, this resource is abused and taken advantage of by most teens, and not used in a way that could get the best benefits. It can have negative effects on teens like depression, psychological problems, a decrease in self-esteem, not having proper food at the proper time. Many teens love social media because of its wide connectivity and function.

There is a thin line between habit and addiction. An addiction is a situation when people "crave" something more than what is actually required. Lack of social exposure is the main cause of social media addiction in teens. Such people tend to stay lonely, disconnected from their surroundings, and people becoming whole new people. 92% of teens use social media, among which 81% of older teens and 68% of teens aged 13 and 14. 71% of teens use Facebook, 52% use Instagram, 41% use Snapchat, 33% use Twitter, and 14% use Tumblr on a daily basis.

They find it challenging to deal with peer pressure and start comparing their lives. Thus, their anxiety level rises, which causes illness. 2,617 times per day, the average mobile phone user will tap, swipe and click their phones. Social media sites are the most visited websites in comparison to any other website. Not only teens, adults who are addicted start showing low productivity at work. 25% of young people are dealing with problematic usage of mobile phones.

Social networking also messes with their ability to think independently. They're more likely to change their mind about "liking" some things and posts if they see that they're popular or not, because, of course, people like to go with the trend and they want to blend in like the rest. People should constantly evaluate themselves by monitoring their social media activities. They should keep track of how much time they are spending on such websites. Furthermore, it would be best to take control of their actions before they turn into a social media addiction.

Have you wondered what GST means? Have you found it difficult to navigate through the maze of terms that are in use today in the economic scene of this country. Here is a ready reckoner that will act as a handy guide.

#### **Goods and Service Tax**

GST is currently levied on all products except petroleum, alcoholic beverages, and tobacco, as well as stamp duty on real estate transactions, in four slabs of 5, 12, 18, and 28 percent. Most of the articles have zero GST as per the latest revision of the tax rates last year. The GST implemented from July 1, 2017 is regarded as the major taxation reform ever to be implemented in India since independence in 1974. GST was supposed to go into effect in April 2010, but it was delayed due to political issues and competing stakeholder interests. The primary objective behind the development of GST is to subsume all sorts of indirect taxes in India like Central Excise Tax, VAT/Sales Tax, etc., and implement one taxation system in India. The GST-based taxation system brings more transparency in the taxation system, increases the GDP rate from 1% to 2%, and reduces tax theft and corruption in the country. The GST Concept, along with the significant working comparison of Indian GST taxation system rates with other world economies, also presented in-depth coverage regarding advantages to various sectors of the Indian economy after levying GST and outlined some challenges of GST implementation. GST implemented a 'one nation, one tax' system, but its impact on various industries differs slightly. The first level of differentiation will come in depending on whether the industry deals with manufacturing, distributing and retailing or providing a service.

#### Types of Goods and Services: Intra State Goods and Service Tax: Central Goods and Service Tax (CGST)

CGST is applicable on the supply of goods and services of standard services and commodities and this can be amended periodically by a specialized body under the Central Government. The transactions happen within the same state and the revenue collected goes to the Central Government, and the GST charged is 9%.

### State Goods and Service Tax/Union Territory Goods and Service Tax (SGST/UGST)

It is the supply of Goods and Services within the same state /union territory and it is governed by the State Government and the GST charged is 9%.

#### **Interstate Goods and Services**

Integrated Goods and Service Tax: GST is charged on the supply of commodities from one state to another state. The Government of India

will collect revenue under the IGST. The GST charged is 18%.

#### **GST Council**

GST Council is a governing body of GST having 33 members, out of which 2 members are from the Centre and 31 members are from 29 states and 3 union territories with legislation. The GST Council is an apex member committee to modify, reconcile or procure any law or regulation based on the context of goods and services tax in India. The GST Council consists of the following members: the Union Finance Minister (as Chairperson), the Union Ministers of State in charge of Finance or Revenue, and the Ministers of State in charge of taxation as nominated by each State. The GST Council is headed by the Union Finance Minister, Nirmala Sitharaman, assisted by the Finance Ministers of all the States.





#### **HSN Code**

The HSN Code is a 4-to-8-digit code for identifying the applicable rate of GST on different products as per the CGST Rules of the Government of India. If the company has a turnover of up to INR 15 million in the preceding financial year, then the company has a turnover of more than INR 15 million but up to INR 50 million, then the company needs to mention the first two digits of the HSN Code while supplying goods and services on invoices, but if the turnover crosses INR 50 million, then the company needs to mention all four digits of the HSN Code.

#### The Effect of the Goods and Services Tax

#### The Impact of GST on Manufacturers

Multiple indirect taxes have also increased the administrative costs for manufacturers and distributors, but within place, the compliance burden has eased and this sector will grow more strongly.

#### Sector-Wise Impact Analysis Logistics

In a vast country like India, the logistics sector forms the backbone of the economy. A well organized and mature logistics industry has the potential to leapfrog the "Make in India" initiative of the Government of India to its desired position.

#### E-Commerce

The GST will help the e-com sectors' continued growth but the long term, it will be particularly expensive because the GST law specifically proposes a tax collection at source (TCS) mechanism. The current rate of TCS is 1%.

#### **Telecommunication**

In the telecom sector, prices will come down after GST. Manufactures will save on costs through efficient management of inventory and by consolidating their warehouses.

#### **Textile**

The Indian textile industry provides employment to a large number of skilled and unskilled workers in the country. It accounts for about 10% of annual exports, and its value is expected to rise under GST.

#### **Real Estate**

The real estate sector is one of the most important sectors of the Indian economy, contributing significantly to job creation. The impact of GST on the real estate sector cannot be fully assessed as it largely depends on tax rates. However, the sector will see substantial benefits from GST implementation.

#### **Agriculture**

The agricultural sector is one of the most important contributors, accounting for approximately 16% of Indian GDP. One of the major issues faced by the agricultural sector is transportation of agri-products across the state lines all over India. The GST will resolve the issue of transportation.

#### Pharma

On the whole, GST is benefiting the pharma and healthcare industries. The pharma sector is hoping for a tax respite as it will make affordable healthcare easy to access by all.

#### **FMCG**

The FMCG sector will also benefit from GST by saving a considerable amount of money on logistics. FMCG sector currently accounts for 2–7% of the total cost, but is expected to drop to 1.5% after the implementation of GST.

## World Environment Day 2022 - Only One Earth

Our planet is choking on plastic, it is time to change how we produce, consume and dispose of the plastic we use. Today, we produce about 400 million tonnes of plastic waste every year. Systemic change is needed to stop the flow of plastic waste ending up in the environment. Since the 1970s, the rate of plastic production has grown faster than that of any other material. If historic growth trends continue, global production of primary plastic is forecasted to reach 1,100 million tonnes by 2050. We have also seen a worrying shift towards single-use plastic products, items that are meant to be thrown away after a single short use.

Approximately 36 per cent of all plastics produced are used in packaging, including single-use plastic products for food and beverage containers, approximately 85 per cent of which ends up in landfills or as unregulated waste. Systemic change is needed to stop the flow of plastic waste ending up in the environment. Of the seven billion tonnes of plastic waste generated globally so far, less than 10 per cent has been recycled. Millions of of plastic waste are lost to the tonnes environment, or sometimes shipped thousands of kilometres to destinations where it is mostly burned or dumped. Plastic waste whether in a river, the ocean, or on land can persist in the environment for centuries reducing the environmental assimilative capacity.





Let us practice adapt best management practices to restore Environmental Capacity following JaGo Equation of sustainability and transformative actions mentioned below:

**Shop Sustainably:** Next time you are out shopping, choose food with no plastic packaging, carry a reusable bag, buy local products, and refill containers to reduce your plastic waste and effect on the environment.

**Practice Zero-Waste Lifestyle:** Become a zero-waste champion. Invest in sustainable, environment-friendly products- reusable coffee mugs, water bottles and food wraps.

**Travel Sustainably:** When you are on holiday, refuse miniature bottles in hotel rooms, take your own reusable drinking bottle.

**Be an advocate for change:** Ask your fellow colleagues, local eateries not to use plastic packaging, refuse plastic cutlery and straws, and tell them why. (To preserve Environmental Capacity)



#### Did you know?

A glass bottle can take up to 1 million years to decompose.

Glass takes an incredibly long time to break down. It can take a glass bottle more than a million years to decompose in the environment, possibly even more if it lands in a landfill. This effectively means that glass manufactured and used 5000 years ago may still be present in the environment. Because its life cycle is so long, and because glass doesn't leach any chemicals, it's better to repurpose and reuse it again before recycling it or dumping it in the refills.

An environmental organization has been named after her as Thimmakka's Resources for Environmental Education in the U.S.

## Waterman

Johad is a small earthen check dam which stores and conserves rainwater helping people overcome water scarcity during the hot and dry seasons. It allows water to percolate underground and recharges the groundwater table. These ancient systems were forgotten or lost to modernity until Rajendra Singh of Alwar, Rajasthan travelled extensively disseminating knowledge about these ancient systems of water storage, motivating and helping people revive more than 3000 johads spread across 650 villages across Alwar.

These efforts have not gone in vain; the River Arvari flows majestically now, transforming into a perennial river from a seasonal one. The groundwater table has risen, and there has been a 33% increase in forest cover in that area. Called the Waterman of India, Rajendra Singh won the Magsaysay Award in 2001 and the Stockholm Water Prize in 2015 for his pioneering efforts in water conservation.

# Know your English



# Common errors in English

This column will feature some of the common errors that creep in while speaking English. Knowing the errors will help in correcting oneself and speaking the language without making any mistakes.

Incorrect: Every girl must bring their own lunch. Correct: Every girl must bring her own lunch. This is a case of pronoun disagreement.

Incorrect: This is my brothers briefcase. Correct: This is my brother's briefcase. Apostrophes are used to show possession.

Incorrect: Its a cold day for August. Correct: It's a cold day for August.

Here apostrophe is used to indicate a contraction for "it is."

Incorrect: This is mines. Correct: This is mine.

The possessive pronoun 'mine' is shown in singular number.

Incorrect: She nearly drove the car for eight hours a day. Correct: She drove the car for nearly eight hours a day.

Always place a modifier directly next to the word it is supposed to modify. The modifier should refer to a specific word in the sentence clearly. Misplaced modifiers can create confusion and ambiguity.

The adverb "nearly" is modifying the adjective "eight," not the verb "drove." Hence place the adverb in front of the adjective it's modifying.

Incorrect: The striking workers did not except the compromise formula.

Correct: The striking workers did not accept the compromise formula.

Similar sounding words have different spellings and different meanings. Take care not to mix them up. Another example is given below.

Incorrect: There mother travelled with them. Correct: Their mother travelled with them.

# Know your English



## English is the official language of air communication

In 2001, the International Civil Aviation Organisation (ICAO) declared English as the official language for air communication. It is mandatory for pilots and air traffic controllers to understand English in order to communicate uniformly. How is Aviation English any different? It is a combination of simple English and professional terms that includes around 300 words. Pilots must pass a language test to get their license. How did this come about? What led to making English the universal language for aviation? An unfortunate accident in 1977 happened due to language miscommunication. The control tower failed to comprehend a message from a Dutch pilot and this tragically resulted in a collision of two planes, killing 583 people. Aviation English thus became a necessity.
