Academic success sits lightly on the Professor whose outstanding contribution to the field of education is mind boggling.

He has delivered over 200 talks on Environmental Conservation, Materials and Environment, Water Management, RWH, the Role of Youth in development in schools, colleges, professional institutes, and Rotary Clubs; chaired Youth Leadership workshops in Maharashtra, Karnataka, UP and Goa; published articles in both national and international journals; authored chapters in books; and presented over 24 conference papers, to name a few.

Her journey with the Presidency Group of Institutions began in 1994 and her professional life is linked with the destiny of the PGI as it was making a mark on the education scene of the city.

She has been a pivot in the success story as she readied the documents for affiliations, arranged for candidates to be interviewed, issued appointment letters after ensuring all due processes were followed, and organised the schedules for parents to be interviewed before getting their wards admitted to the Presidency Schools.

In short, you can see her footprint in every activity that has gone behind the scenes. Currently, she is busy with Talent Search and Recruitment.

Dr. K. Malarvili Professor of Kannada, Department of Languages, Presidency University.

A strong desire to lay a solid foundation in language, culture and traditions and mould students into good citizens of this country drew Professor Malarvili into teaching.

The teacher in her believes that while subjects like Engineering, Medicine, Science, Mathematics etc. might be the most sought after in the education scene today, it is the study of language and literature that moulds the character of the students and prepares them for a meaningful life ahead by exposing them to real-life anecdotes, stories from the epics and legends, powerful poems and folktales that irrigate their hearts and strengthen their minds.

Prof. Malarvili began her career as a research assistant in 1988 and went on to become a teacher in 1990. It has been nearly 21 years now with the Presidency Group and during the course of her glorious career, she has published books, presented papers and chaired conferences in various parts of the country.

She recalls with fondness the high point of her career, when she sponsored a student from Sri Lanka who was studying in Presidency College to publish his poems and release the book in the presence of the honourable Chairman of the PGI. This work now finds pride of place in the Tamil text prescribed by Bangalore University.

Looking back, she rues the fact that technology came into her life much later in her career; otherwise, the richness of Kannada language and literature could have gone beyond the borders of the State and benefitted the country and the world at large.



Dr Malarvili goes by the dictum,

anna daanam param daanam, vidya daanam atah param. annena kshanika trupthi, yaavat jeevancha vidyeya.

Donating food is the best... donating knowledge is the best among the best.... food can satisfy one's hunger for a short time... but with knowledge, one can be satisfied all through life.

Dr. Malar, as she is affectionately known on campus, is inspired by the hard work and the farsighted vision of the Chancellor, who has created a thriving eco system that has enabled thousands of students to get an education in society and considers him a role model.

Dr. Malar's crowning achievement, was co-authoring four books on Sangam literature. The Kannada translation of the Sangam literature, compiled into 18 books, is a first as Kannada holds the unique distinction of being the first among world languages to have seen the work translated from Tamil. Trophies adorn her home and desk and she has been conferred with the Kuvempu Award and the Sahitya Seva Rathna Award, to name a few, in addition to having authored innumerable books.



Artificial Intelligence: Boon or Bane




Have you any doubts about anything under the sky? Google search is our go-to search engine for all sorts of things. What makes it so smart that it gives ready answers all the time? How do drones work so efficiently? What makes our smart phones so intuitive? Well, we all know that it is artificial intelligence. What exactly is AI? Read on

"Artificial Intelligence" (AI) is a branch of computer science that deals with the development of machines that can perform tasks that require human intelligence, like speech recognition, language translation, and decision-making. AI is said to be the simulation of human intelligence in machines that are programmed to think and perform like humans.

Over the past decade, AI advancement has gained exponential momentum, and according to Gray Scott, a techno philosopher,"There is no way for a human mind to keep up with an AI machine by 2035." But, should we be encouraging AI's rapid growth? Is the rise of "artificial intelligence" a boon or a bane to human society?Now I will throw light on the pros and cons of AI to give you an idea of it.

Yes! From an industrial aspect, AI has indeed simplified man's work and it has increased the production rates and, in turn, the profits of companies. For a human being, performing tedious tasks is time-consuming. In such instances, AI algorithms are developed to perform complex tasks. AI machines are capable of performing multiple tasks at a particular period and function faster than humans. Also, AI machines do not require refreshment like humans and can work for longer periods. They are capable of performing tasks and continuous work, ensuring quality output.

Al is important because, for the first time, traditionally human capabilities can be carried out in software inexpensively and at scale. Al can be applied to every sector to enable new possibilities and efficiencies. The Al-driven applications have a higher speed of execution and have higher operational ability and accuracy, which are also highly significant in tedious and monotonous jobs compared to humans. All these reasons have all led to the inevitable rise of Al in the modern era.





Currently, the most widely used machine in our daily lives is a smartphone, which results in us knowingly and unknowingly using the benefits of AI. A few examples that demonstrate the use of AI in our daily lives are speech recognition systems used in our search engines on our smartphones, GPS used for navigation and fingerprint recognition, and face recognition systems on our smartphones for security. According to Google Scholar Dave Waters, "Predicting the future isn't magic, it's artificial intelligence." From this statement, it is evident that many scientists and research philosophers do believe that AI advancement is necessary to thrive in the future.

Though AI might have helped in the progression of technology, it still has its fair share of drawbacks. One of the major drawbacks is the high cost of AI machines and software. Though complex AI might increase the production rates, the high cost of AI does take a large toll on the companies, especially start-ups. Moreover, the AI machines require regular maintenance after a particular point in time, which results in higher costs to be incurred.

Also, in the case of humans, we depend upon our experience and perform accordingly in the future, whereas Al's do not have experience. Al machines act according to the algorithm that is set for their functioning. They do not react to the environment, and hence, there is no room for autonomous evolution. This is one of the main reasons that humans are better than Al.

Today, one of the growing concerns in the global economy is how the rise of AI will affect employment rates. Unfortunately, according to a University of Chicago survey, the unemployment rate is drastically increasing all over the world with the advancement of AI. To enhance productivity, enterprises are adopting AI-based technologies that are now replacing human jobs and making us more dependent on machines. This would lead to a major loss in the ability to think, which results in creativity and ideas. Stephen Hawking, an English theoretical physicist, stated that "Artificial Intelligence will either be the best thing that's ever happened to us, or it will be the worst thing to human civilization."

Now can we conclude whether "artificial intelligence" is a boon or a bane? At present, there is still some ambiguity on the matter, and hence we cannot infer whether AI is required or not for the future. Though AI is indeed helping in the advancement of our human society at the moment, it goes without saying that there are drawbacks to this advancement. As a technophile, I hope that the advancement of AI will have a positive impact on our lives and be beneficial to the entire world.....

Incorrect: We were discussing about what happened yesterday. Correct: 'We were discussing what happened yesterday A discussion already suggests you are talking about something. The word 'about' is unnecessary.

Incorrect: Me and my friends are going out for dinner Correct: My friends and I are going out for dinner. Putting oneself last is more out of politeness

Incorrect: I couldn't able to attend the class. Correct: I wasn't able to attend the class. Both can and able to are used to explain the ability of a person. Using couldn't (could not) along with able is redundant.

Incorrect: Don't forget to reply back. Correct: Don't forget to reply Reply already denotes a response to something. Adding 'back' is unnecessary.
