At Presidency University, we would like to put forth one idea that has been discussed in policy circles for some time now. This concerns the fact that private business in India has grown rapidly, and some of our business heads are now among the richest people in the world. So, should they now be held responsible for society and its betterment? Or should they remain committed to their firms? It is often said that a businessman contributes to society by simply ensuring that he runs a successful business that provides employment and good-quality goods to consumers.

That in itself is great social service. However, in most developed countries, we see large corporations involved in philanthropy and public service. Microsoft is a big example where the former Chairman, Bill Gates, now spends all his time providing health care to poor countries across the world. In India, unfortunately, this culture has yet to strike root, and we don't see many industry heads working on social issues as **Individual Social Responsibility (ISR)**. They all have their foundations and their **Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR)** divisions, but more because they are mandated to do so and not because of a genuine philanthropic spirit. This idea of CSR and ISR is interesting, and we should examine how it is not just a nice and noble thing for corporations and individuals to indulge in. CSR and ISR also make great economic and business sense. When firms spend money on social development, healthcare, poverty alleviation, education, and environmental protection, they also enhance their shareholder value and their customer base. When individuals do so, they build new brands and greater acceptability.

Large corporations across the world have a history of involvement in philanthropic activities and social responsibility. In modern times, the trend started with a growing realization of and understanding of the need for sustainable development and the degradation of the environment that irresponsible industrialization was causing. Climate change seen across the world forced the issue, as many civil society organizations and NGOs joined the fray in denouncing large corporations that were seen as neglecting their social duties. Faced with this backlash that was seen as hurting their customer bases, firms across the world started focusing on earning goodwill. There are various reasons for managers to invest in CSR, focused on **shareholder influence, altruism, or threats from activists and civil society organizations**. This stakeholder approach, where it was argued that customers, regulators, and even voters were important for firms, pushed managers to look seriously at societal concerns, even if this added to the costs of running the firm.

The first such response was by way of philanthropy, where rich business persons gave out money to support what they considered to be useful activities. This approach was soon seen as not being enough. There was clearly a need to convince all stakeholders of the genuineness of the effort. A great example of this was Shell Corporation, which was rocked by bad publicity and a dent in its reputation.

It quickly reacted by increasing its social spending exponentially, and now it is seen as a great example of CSR by private firms. On the other hand, Chiquita has spent huge amounts of money on research and development of new techniques in soil conservation, testing, use of pesticides, and waste management. Both Chiquita and Starbucks are examples of large firms that have not only invested in CSR but have built strong partnerships with NGOs to build their capacities in managing their social responsibility. Chiquita with the RainForest Alliance and Starbucks with TransFair have evolved collaborative mechanisms that enable the firm to develop sound and sustainable practices that appeal to the stakeholder and the shareholder alike. MacDonald, on the other hand, is an example of a large

All this gave rise to a major push on the part of large firms, especially multinational firms, to invest more and more in the social sector. The focus shifted from the stakeholder to the shareholder. In this, the literature that came about questioned the very reason for firms to be involved in CSR at all. Involvement in social programs and social growth was seen as a personal and managerial decision. It was argued that at any point, it is only a small minority of shareholders who may participate in any CSR or ISR decisions. It is neither possible nor feasible to involve a large number of shareholders in such decision-making.

It is therefore critical to examine whether there is a shareholder interest in CSR and whether CSR maximizes share value too. The literature that emerged showed successfully how good CSR promotes stakeholder as well as shareholder well-being. The best example in this case was the rise in the premium of the green funds and the green firms that took off in the European Union in the 1980s.

Today, it is the shareholders who urge management to invest in CSR. One reason, of course, is that shareholders feel good about their firms investing in what is considered responsible behavior, but the other point is the growing awareness that CSR and ISR actually fetch higher returns and build a healthy bottom line. Cochran and Wood (1984) pointed out the direct relationship between ISR and financial performance. A good example of this has been IBM's Reinventing Education Program, which organizes training programs for non-English children to pick up the English language. This has not only helped build a good image for IBM; it has also allowed IBM to reach out to a large new market for its speech recognition products.

Going back to the example of green firms, it is often seen that many firms today over-comply with standards laid out by regulators, invest large amounts of money in the use of environmentally friendly technologies, and build capacities inside and outside their organizations that help raise awareness of sustainability in the larger community. It is therefore becoming clear that management and the shareholder both believe strongly in the economics of ISR. Today, it is imperative for firms to invest in ISR only to maintain their competitive edge and retain consumers and employees.

Consumers are willing to pay a premium for products that come from responsible firms. Employees are likely to join and stay at firms that engage in CSR. In a mature and aware market, firms need to be proactive to maintain their market shares. Activists influence consumers; citizens are concerned about the environment they live in; and shareholders are keen on maximizing long-term returns. All this makes management take corporate social responsibility seriously, build it into their costs just as they would in research and development costs, and ensure that their efforts are publicized and recognized. It is only through this realization that CSR and ISR make financial sense and that they help build a sound bottom line that modern firms can remain successful.

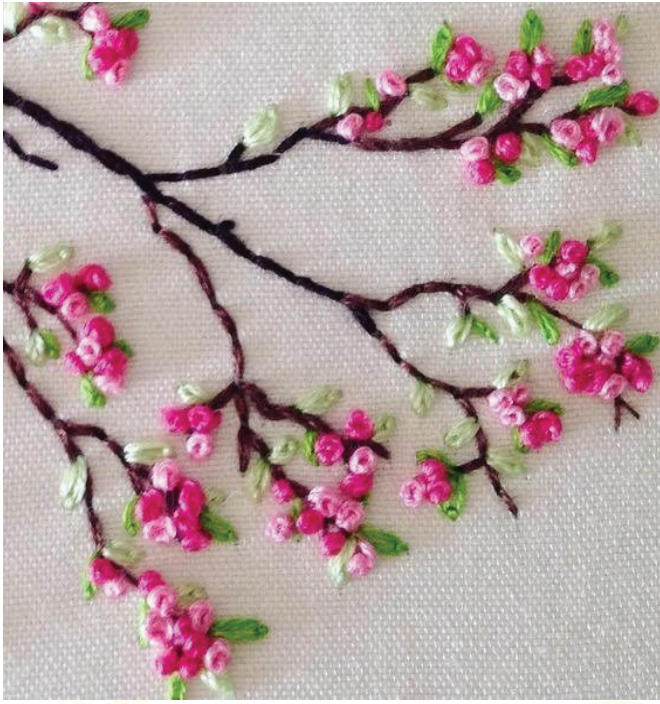

The students were able to sell their handmade products, and the mehandi artwork caught the attention of many.



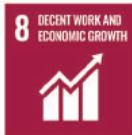

- Aid in bringing about holistic development in students

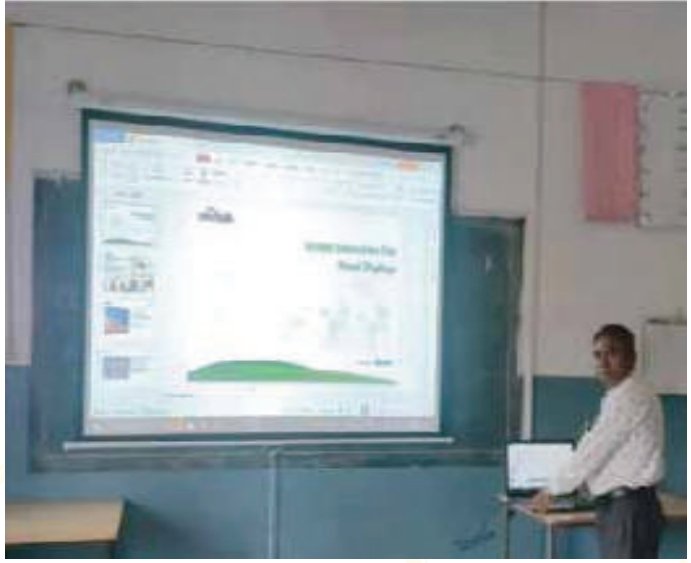

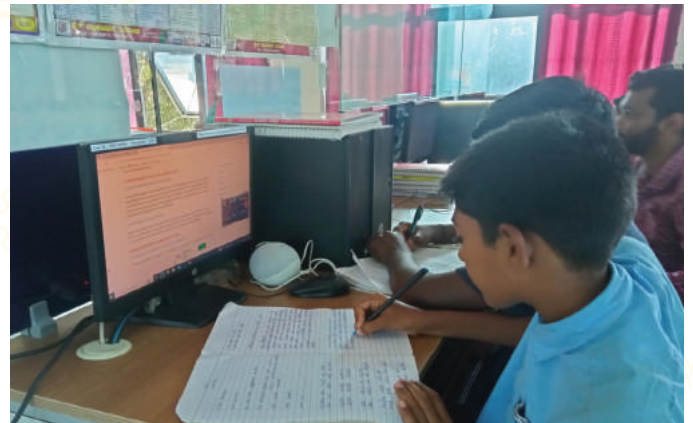
The library has been sponsored and set up under the professional supervision of the Presidency University. The dignitaries present on the occasion were Sri S. R. Vishwanath, Hon'ble MLA, Smt. Sujatha Srinivas Reddy, President, Rajanakunte Gram Panchayat, several officials of Gram Panchayat, Taluk Panchayat, and Zilla Panchayat, the Education Department, media persons, and others.

Objectives

- Provide study materials for various competitive examinations, primarily those conducted by the Government, Departments of Karnataka and Government of India;
- Organize events such as lectures, talks, etc. in order to motivate and provide guidance to the youth in preparing for various competitive examinations;
- Conduct training programs to improve the skills of the youth and make them job-ready;
- Support all education and skill development activities of the Gram Panchayat.

Facilities Provided

- The library has 15 new internet-enabled computers, in addition to facilities for IT training.
- Subscribes to 10 daily newspapers and 25 magazines, both in Kannada and English.
- The library has a website that is hosted on the Presidency University server for the time being, and the address is panchayatlibrary.presidencyuniversity.in. The website can be accessed through mobile devices and QR codes.
